# Adran yr Amgylchedd, Bwyd a Materion Gwledig (DEFRA) a'r Gwasanaeth Milfeddygol Gwladol

1. Mae gan DEFRA, a'r Weinyddiaeth Amaethyddiaeth, Pysgodfeydd a Bwyd (MAFF) cyn hynny, gyfrifoldeb o dan Orchymyn Clwy'r Traed a'r Genau 1983 a Deddf Iechyd Anifeiliaid 1981 dros ymdrin ag achosion o Glwy'r Traed a'r Genau. Y Gwasanaeth Milfeddygol Gwladol yw adran filfeddygol weithredol DEFRA ar gyfer ymdrin â materion iechyd anifeiliaid.

# Cynulliad Cenedlaethol Cymru

- 2. Diffinnir cyfrifoldebau'r Cynulliad gan y fframwaith cyfreithiol a sefydlwyd gan Ddeddf Iechyd Anifeiliaid 1981. Ni throsglwyddodd Gorchymyn Cynulliad Cenedlaethol Cymru (Trosglwyddo Swyddogaethau) 1999 swyddogaeth "Gweinidog" Deddf Iechyd Anifeiliaid 1981 i'r Cynulliad Cenedlaethol ac eithrio mewn perthynas â rhai clefydau penodol. Mae swyddogaeth rheoli clefydau mewn perthynas â chlwy'r Traed a'r Genau yn un o swyddogaethau'r "Gweinidog" ac felly ni chafodd ei throsglwyddo i'r Cynulliad.
- 3. Fodd bynnag rhoddodd y Gorchymyn Trosglwyddo Swyddogaethau gyfrifoldeb i'r Cynulliad dros swyddogaethau "Gweinidog priodol" a "Gweinidogion" o dan Ddeddf Iechyd Anifeiliaid 1981. Roedd hyn yn golygu fod gan y Cynulliad rôl i wneud rhywfaint o ddeddfwriaeth ar glwy'r Traed a'r Genau ar y cyd â MAFF/DEFRA, mewn perthynas â materion lle'r oedd angen deddfwriaeth i alluogi'r Gweinidog MAFF i ymarfer ei swyddogaethau rheoli clefydau yng Nghymru. Yn ystod argyfwng clwy'r Traed a'r Genau, gwnaed deddfwriaeth gan y Cynulliad er enghraifft, ar faterion megis cau troedffyrdd, cneifio a dipio defaid. Gwnaed y newidiadau hyn

ar gyngor milfeddygol ac fe'u gwnaed yn sydyn. Gan nad oedd y swyddogaeth "Gweinidog" wedi'i throsglwyddo parhaodd y cyfrifoldeb dros weithredu'r ddeddfwriaeth ar y cyd gyda'r Gweinidog dros Amaethyddiaeth, Pysgodfeydd a Bwyd.

- 4. Yn ogystal, penodwyd y Cynulliad Cenedlaethol i wneud deddfwriaeth o dan adran 2.2 o Ddeddf Cymunedau Ewropeaidd 1972 at ddibenion CAP. Golyga hyn fod gan y Cynulliad y rôl o drawsosod deddfwriaeth Gymunedol i ddeddfwriaeth gartref.
- 5. Ond trwy gytundeb s41 Deddf Llywodraeth Cymru 1998, llwyddodd y Cynulliad i gyflawni rhai o swyddogaethau'r Gweinidog dros Amaethyddiaeth, Pysgodfeydd a Bwyd ar ran y Gweinidog ac <u>nid</u> y Cynulliad). Cytunwyd y byddai staff y Cynulliad Cenedlaethol yn gallu ymarfer cyfrifoldebau o dan s34 Deddf Iechyd Anifeiliaid 1981 a Gorchymyn Clwy'r Traed a'r Genau (Darganfod Gwerth) (Cymru) (Rhif 4) 2001 (a ddiwygiwyd neu a ddisodlwyd o bryd i'w gilydd). Bu staff y Cynulliad Cenedlaethol hefyd yn gwasanaethu'r Gweinidog dros Amaethyddiaeth gan ddarparu gwasanaethau gweinyddol, proffesiynol neu dechnegol mewn perthynas ag ymarfer swyddogaethau'r Gweinidog dros Amaethyddiaeth o dan adrannau 16, 31, 33, 34, 36 a pharagraff 3 Atodlen 3 i Ddeddf Iechyd Anifeiliaid 1981 a Gorchymyn Clwy'r Traed a'r Genau 1983, a ddiwygiwyd neu a ddisodlwyd o bryd i'w gilydd.

# Comisiwn Ewropeaidd (yn enwedig o safbwynt brechiadau)

6. Cyflwynodd Cyfarwyddeb 85/511 y GE fel y'i diwygiwyd fesurau Cymunedol ar gyfer rheoli clwy'r Traed a'r Genau.

### 7. Ar frechiadau:

- Diwygiwyd Cyfarwyddeb 85/511 i wahardd defnyddio brechiadau ers 1992. Mae erthygl 13 yn caniatáu defnydd brys o frechlynnau, ond nid yw'n ofynnol, pan gaiff clwy'r Traed a'r Genau ei gadarnhau a phan yw'n bygwth ehangu.
- Anogir Aelod-Wladwriaethau i gyflwyno cynlluniau manwl yn ymwneud ag unrhyw ddefnydd o frechlynnau i'w cymeradwyo ymlaen llaw drwy'r Pwyllgor Milfeddygol Sefydlog cyn eu gweithredu. Gall Aelod-Wladwriaethau droi at ddefnyddio'r brechlyn cyn cymeradwyo'r cynlluniau ar yr amod nad oes perygl i fuddiannau cymunedol sylfaenol.
- Mae deddfwriaeth fferyllol (Cyfarwyddeb 81/851) yn ei gwneud yn ofynnol i holl gynnyrch meddyginiaethol milfeddygol gael ei awdurdodi ond mae Erthygl 4 yn caniatáu eithriad i ddefnyddio cynnyrch anawdurdodedig os digwydd haint difrifol. Dyma'r eithriad y mae'r Comisiwn yn ei ddefnyddio i ryddhau brechlyn o Fanc Brechlynnau Ewrop.
- Mae Penderfyniad y GE 2001/303 yn pennu'r amodau ar gyfer brechu rhywogaethau sydd mewn perygl (yn ogystal â bridiau prin ac anifeiliaid y mae eu hangen ar gyfer ymchwil bwysig ac unigryw).
- Gweithredir gwahardd defnyddio brechlynnau clwy'r traed a'r genau yng Nghymru drwy Reoliadau Clwy'r Traed a'r Genau (Rheoli Brechiadau) (Cymru) 2001 a chyflwynwyd

Fodd bynnag, mae Prydain Fawr yn cael ei hystyried fel uned epidemiolegol unigol ac fel y cyfryw mae'r un gofynion UE a rhyngwladol yn berthnasol i'r Alban ag i weddill y DU.
- 10. Mae'r gwahaniaeth o ran cyfrifoldebau rhwng y Cynulliad Cenedlaethol a'r Alban yn seiliedig ar y ffordd y gwnaed setliad datganoli yr Alban. ### **WEEK COMMENCING 19 FEBRUARY**

23<sup>rd</sup> February - National Assembly for Wales Agriculture Departments (NAWAD), Farming and Rural Conservation Agency (FRCA), Countryside Wales (CW) stop farm visits and inspections to avoid risk of spreading disease

25<sup>th</sup> February - suspect case at Welsh Country Food Slaughterhouse, Gaerwen, Anglesey. Minister and Farming Unions informed.

23<sup>rd</sup> February - national movement controls introduced.

# **WEEK COMMENCING 26 FEBRUARY**

### **POLICY**

26<sup>th</sup> February - senior member of NAWAD staff sent to London to strengthen communication with MAFF on disease control and animal movements policy and feed in Welsh perspective. NAW presence strengthened from the middle of March with visits by additional staff. Two full time NAWAD staff present in London from 2<sup>nd</sup> April 2001 to attend COBR and JCC.

Memo from LACOTS asks local authorities to collect stray animals following advice from NAW.

IP1 Gaerwen, Anglesey (2001/13); IP2 Knighton, Powys (2001/19); IP3 Painscastle, Builth Wells, Powys (2001/22); and IP35 Hadnock Court, Monmouthshire (2001/490) confirmed.

26<sup>th</sup> February - Caernarfon Division establishes incident/operations room in response to suspect case in Anglesey.

27th February - first case in Wales confirmed at the slaughterhouse in Gaerwen, Anglesey

27<sup>th</sup> February - Environment Agency (EA) and Forestry Commission visits stopped on MAFF advice. Environment Agency FMD Task Group set up to provide guidance to EA staff

State Veterinary Service DVMs agree to DECC in Llanishen adopting operations in Montgomery (an area normally falling under the North Wales Division's remit).

DECC in Llanishen establishes 'Team Structure' based on disease control contingency planning and experience of classical swine fever.

28<sup>th</sup> February – National Assembly for Wales (NAW) Divisional Office at Llandrindod Wells establishes incident room

First IPs confirmed in Powys at Waen, Knighton and Bryngarth, Painscastle.

Temporary Veterinary Inspectors (TVIs) recruited from local practices.

North Wales: Daily meetings begin with SVS, NAW, EA, local authority and Police.

### LIVESTOCK MOVEMENTS

27<sup>th</sup> February - Infected Area restrictions imposed around first IP on Anglesey.

Licensing system to move to slaughter livestock introduced over the weekend of 3<sup>rd</sup>-4<sup>th</sup> March. Open for applications on 5<sup>th</sup> March. First animals moved on 5<sup>th</sup> March. Liaison with MHS Wales, LACOTS in Wales, Guild of Welsh Abattoirs, farming unions to enable the system to operate effectively and to ensure that small abattoirs in Wales were covered. Welsh guidance

issued to local authorities to help them run the scheme (4<sup>th</sup> March). Burden of MHS charges on small abattoirs discussed with MAFF and solution reached (6<sup>th</sup> March).

Milk producers notified of implications of licensing restrictions implications.

FMD Declatory Order extends restrictions on livestock movements for a further 2 weeks to 16<sup>th</sup> March - permits moves of pigs, cattle, sheep from outside local authorities to slaughter.

26<sup>th</sup> February - Assembly establishes a combined communications and telephone helpline room in Cathays Park, Cardiff. Open 7am to 10pm weekdays and 10am to 4pm on weekends .

Anglesey IP: NAW staff inform farmers in Infected Area by letter.

26 February – letter issued to all Artificial Insemination centres on restriction of movements of semen to premises in infected areas.

27<sup>th</sup> February - Q&A material sent to farming unions.

1<sup>st</sup> March – NAW press release: 'Edwina Hart announces £5.6million for voluntary and community groups'.

2<sup>nd</sup> March - regular FMD slot introduced on BBC Radio Wales with Assistant Chief Veterinary Officer for Wales or the Deputy Assistant Chief Veterinary Officer for Wales. (Continued until the end of June) Other local radio stations also held appropriate interviews.

North Wales: DVM begins daily interviews with media.

### LIVESTOCK MOVEMENTS

Major concern from farmers about the effect of the restrictions on moving livestock; urgent and desperate animal welfare problems becoming obvious in some areas. Farmers ringing Cardiff and Divisional Offices in emotional distress.

After extensive discussions with MAFF, local movement and occupational movement licenses

introduced to allow livestock to be moved short distances for animal welfare reasons.

10<sup>th</sup> March - First licenses issued by NAWAD Divisional Offices under enormous pressure. Final details of the scheme were received at 9pm on 9<sup>th</sup> March, the doors opened for applications 9am on 10<sup>th</sup> March (Saturday).

Welfare problems of animals away on tack remained, as much larger distances involved, and disease risks harder to resolve.

Minister informed of Chief Veterinary Officer's decision that all sheep traded through Welshpool market after 19<sup>th</sup> February should be culled, along with all animals they have come into contact with subsequently.

## **WEEK COMMENCING 19 MARCH**

### **POLICY**

23<sup>rd</sup> March - Tanllan case, previously confirmed on clinical grounds, comes back negative from lab tests. Link to fat lamb section of Welshpool no longer proven. Decision therefore taken by SVS in Wales to limit the Welshpool cull to ewes, where the link was proven by the Felindre case.

23<sup>rd</sup> March – decision reached that pre-emptive cull should take place in SW Anglesey.

Discussions with London on cull-policy during this week. SVS Wales and NAWAD staff sceptical about the wisdom of a blanket cull of all livestock within 3 km of every case, given that the pattern of disease in much of Wales was different to that in Dumfries, Devon and Cumbria. Even so, epidemiology could still not identify the connections and vector of infection in many cases. A selective approach to culling, therefore remained elusive so when the more moderate policy of contiguous culling was mooted, this was accepted, to prevent the disease spreading from the existing pattern of infection. Agreement that the top priority was to cull animals on farms contiguous to most recent cases.
