Cwestiynau i'r Gweinidog dros Ddatblygu Economaidd Questions to the Minister for Economic Development

Swyddi a Grewyd o Ganlyniad i Fuddsoddiad Tramor Jobs Created as a Result of Foreign Investment

Q1 Brian Gibbons: How many jobs in Wales have been created in the last three years as a result of foreign direct investment? (OAQ17145)

The Minister for Economic Development (Andrew Davies): Between 1 April 1999 and 31 March 2002, the Welsh Development Agency recorded that almost 12,000 new jobs will be created as a result of foreign direct investment.

Brian Gibbons: I am pleased to hear that, although I understand that the international down-turn has made the work more difficult. We must redouble our efforts in this regard, particularly in view of the revival of the economy in the United States of America. Do you agree that there are signs of remarkable resilience within the Welsh economy? Unemployment is at a record low, despite the fact that there has been a down-turn in foreign direct investment.

Andrew Davies: You are right; the foreign direct investment market is increasingly competitive. You have mentioned the global down-turn, which has particularly affected the US. American companies have perhaps a disproportionately high level of investment in the Welsh economy; that is certainly the case in the areas that we represent in south-west Wales. In addition, there is greater competition from regional development agencies in England, and from eastern Europe, where there is a lower cost base and lower wages. However, taking all those points into consideration, the WDA's performance in driving forward the continuing efforts to increase and develop foreign direct investment is a tribute to its actions and those of the Welsh Assembly Government, and to the underlying strength of the Welsh economy.

C1 Brian Gibbons: Faint o swyddi a grewyd yng Nghymru yn ystod y tair blynedd ddiwethaf o ganlyniad i fuddsoddiad uniongyrchol tramor? (OAQ17145)

Y Gweinidog dros Ddatblygu Economaidd (Andrew Davies): Rhwng 1 Ebrill 1999 a 31 Mawrth 2002, cofnododd Awdurdod Datblygu Cymru y bydd ymron i 12,000 o swyddi newydd wedi' u creu o ganlyniad i fuddsoddiad uniongyrchol tramor.

Brian Gibbons: Yr wyf yn falch o glywed hynny, er fy mod yn deall bod y dirywiad rhyngwladol wedi gwneud y gwaith yn fwy anodd. Rhaid inni ddyblu'n hymdrehchion yn hyn o beth, yn enwedig yng ngolwg adfywiad economi Unol Daleithiau America. A ydych yn cytuno bod arwyddion o wydnwch rhyfeddol yn economi Cymru? Mae diweithdra yn is nag erioed, er gwaethaf y ffaith bod dirywiad wedi bod mewn buddsoddiad uniongyrchol tramor.

Andrew Davies: Yr ydych yn iawn; mae'r farchnad buddsoddiad uniongyrchol tramor yn fwyfwy cystadleuol. Yr ydych wedi sôn am y dirywiad byd-eang, sydd wedi effeithio'n arbennig ar yr Unol Daleithiau. Mae buddsoddiad cwmnïau Americanaidd yn economi Cymru o bosibl yn anghyfartal o uchel; mae hynny'n sicr yn wir yn yr ardaloedd yr ydym ni'n eu cynrychioli yn y De-orllewin. Yn ogystal â hynny, mae mwy o gystadleuaeth oddi wrth yr asiantaethau datblygu rhanbarthol yn Lloegr, ac oddi wrth ddwyrain Ewrop, lle y mae sylfaen gostau is a chyflwyni. Er hynny, gan gymryd yr holl bwyntiau hyn i ystyriaeth, mae perfformiad y WDA wrth hyrwyddo'r ymdrehchion parhaus i gynyddu a datblygu buddsoddiad uniongyrchol tramor yn deyrnged i'r camau a gymerodd a rhai Llywodraeth Cynulliad Cymru, ac i gryfder sylfaenol economi Cymru.

Elin Jones: Yn y ffigurau a roddwyd gennych i gyfarfod diwethaf y Pwyllgor Datblygu Economaidd, nodwyd bod 57 y cant o nawdd cymorth rhanbarthol dewisol y llynedd wedi'i roi i fusnesau â'u pencadlysoedd y tu allan i Brydain, a 43 y cant i fusnesau Prydeinig. Pa ganran o'r 43 y cant a roddwyd i fusnesau Cymreig? A ydych yn credu y bydd y ganran bresennol o'r gwariant ar gymorth rhanbarthol dewisol a roddir i fusnesau Cymreig yn ddigonol i fodloni'r her a geir yn 'Cymru'n Ennill' i gynyddu nifer y busnesau cynhenid llwyddiannus?

Andrew Davies: A major plank of our strategy in 'A Winning Wales' is to encourage indigenous business. You quoted some RSA figures, and last year was a record year for granting RSA awards, with £139 million being paid out. In terms of value and the number of offers, it was a record year. An additional £600 million in private sector funding was levered in as a result. I do not have the figures on payments made to Welsh companies to hand, but 157 offers with a value of £42.9 million were made to UK-owned companies, and 36 offers with a value of £57.6 million were made to foreign-owned companies. If you put the value to one side, and consider the number of applications, there is an increasing emphasis on companies based in the UK and Wales, rather than on foreign direct investment.

Alun Cairns: I find it difficult to believe that you are trying to paint a rosy picture, when the wealth gap between England and Wales is widening. A thousand jobs have been lost in Pembrokeshire—an area where unemployment is already double the Welsh national average—and 300 jobs have been lost in Llanelli this week. Is this the legacy for west Wales of five years of Labour Government?

Andrew Davies: The three other parties in the Chamber will be aware of the legacy of the Conservative Government between 1979 and 1997. It is ironic that—[*Interruption.*]

The Presiding Officer: Order. The Minister

Elin Jones: In the figures that you presented to the last meeting of the Economic Development Committee, it was noted that 57 per cent of the regional selective assistance money paid out last year went to companies whose headquarters are based outside of Britain, and that 43 per cent went to British companies. What percentage of the 43 per cent went to Welsh businesses? Do you believe that the percentage of RSA funding currently given to Welsh businesses is sufficient to meet the challenge laid down in 'A Winning Wales' to increase the number of successful indigenous businesses?

Andrew Davies: Un elfen bwysig yn ein strategaeth yn 'Cymru'n Ennill' yw hybu busnes cynhenid. Bu ichi ddyfynnu rhai ffigurau am gymorth rhanbarthol dewisol, a'r flwyddyn ddiwethaf oedd y flwyddyn orau erioed am ddyfarniadau cymorth rhanbarthol dewisol, gan i £139 miliwn gael ei dalu. O ran gwerth a nifer y cynigion, honno oedd y flwyddyn orau erioed. Codwyd £600 miliwn ychwanegol o arian sector preifat o ganlyniad. Nid yw'r ffigurau ar daliadau i gwmniau Cymreig wrth law gennyf, ond gwnaethpwyd 157 o gynigion gwerth £42.9 miliwn i gwmniau y mae eu perchnogion yn y DU, a 36 o gynigion gwerth £57.6 miliwn i gwmniau sydd â pherchnogion tramor. Alun Cairns: Yr wyf yn ei chael yn anodd credu eich bod yn ceisio rhoi darlun gwych, pan yw'r gagendor cyfoeth rhwng Cymru a Lloegr yn ymledu. Collwyd mil o swyddi yn sir Benfro—ardal lle y mae diweithdra eisoes ddwywaith cyfartaledd cenedlaethol Cymru—a chollwyd 300 o swyddi yn Llanelli yr wythnos hon. Ai hyn yw'r gwaddol i orllewin Cymru ar ôl pum mlynedd o Lywodraeth Lafur?

Andrew Davies: Bydd y tair plaid arall yn y Siambwr yn ymwybodol o'r hyn a adawodd y Llywodraeth Geidwadol rhwng 1979 a 1997. Mae'n eironig bod—[*Tori ar draws.*]

Y Llywydd: Trefn. Mae'r Gweinidog yn ateb

is answering questions, and should be heard. We might find it to be of interest.

Andrew Davies: It is ironic that your heroine, the iron lady, presided over the decimation of the steel industry in Wales—*[Interruption.]*

The Presiding Officer: Order. The Minister must be heard. Unlike in England, there are no local elections in Wales today; I do not know what all the fuss is about.

Andrew Davies: The Labour Government in Westminster and the Welsh Assembly Government are having to deal with the legacy of those 18 wasted years. We have record low unemployment in Wales, despite the legacy left us by the Conservative Government, and we also have record low interest rates and record low inflation. We have created a stable economy, in contrast to the boom and bust left by your party's administration in Westminster.

Menter Eiddo Deallusol Intellectual Property Initiative

Q2 Val Lloyd: How will the intellectual property initiative help small and medium-sized enterprises in Wales? (OAQ17116)

Andrew Davies: The Intellectual Property Wales scheme, initiated at Swansea Institute of Higher Education and now based at the law department of the University of Wales, Swansea, has been developed to help small and medium-sized enterprises protect and commercially exploit their intellectual property rights. I am delighted that, with Objective 1 funding, the scheme will provide support and encouragement throughout the process, and financial assistance towards initial costs. SMEs will also be encouraged to use existing support mechanisms to maximise the commercial benefit of the intellectual property they hold to their businesses and to the wider regional economy. Intellectual Property Wales will work in partnership with other business support schemes, such as the innovation and technology counsellor service. I have agreed to launch the scheme

C2 Val Lloyd: Sut y bydd y fenter eiddo deallusol yn helpu mentrau bach a chanolig yng Nghymru? (OAQ17116)

Andrew Davies: Mae cynllun Eiddo Deallusol Cymru, a gychwynnwyd yn Athrofa Addysg Uwch Abertawe ac sydd wedi'i leoli'n awr yn adrann y gyfraith ym Mhrifysgol Cymru, Abertawe, wedi'i ddatblygu i helpu busnesau bach a chanolig eu maint i ddiogelu ac elwa'n fasnachol ar eu hawliau eiddo deallusol. Yr wyf yn falch y bydd y cynllun, gydag arian Amcan 1, yn darparu cymorth ac anogaeth drwy gydol y broses, a chymorth ariannol tuag at y costau dechreuoedd. Anogir busnesau bach a chanolig eu maint hefyd i ddefnyddio'r mecanweithiau cymorth presennol i amlhau i'r eithaf fudd masnachol yr eiddo masnachol sydd ganddynt i'w busnesau ac i'r economi ranbarthol ehangach. Bydd Eiddo Deallusol Cymru'n gweithio mewn partneriaeth â chynlluniau cymorth busnes eraill, fel y gwasanaeth cynghorwyr arloesedd a

on 2 July.

Val Lloyd: I welcome this initiative, as the proper use of intellectual property is essential in order to create a value-added economy. It is good news for small and medium-sized enterprises. Intellectual property is founded on innovation, two drivers of which are the lone inventor and the universities. What assistance is available for those?

Andrew Davies: I agree that the Intellectual Property Wales scheme is extremely important, and many Members, particularly Phil Williams, will be interested in how we exploit individuals' and companies' intellectual property. Intellectual Property Wales has been asked to join the Wales innovators' network, and discussions are ongoing as to how the scheme could be used to benefit individuals as well as SMEs. In terms of including universities, the knowledge exploitation fund will be used to develop a variety of schemes targeted at the commercialisation of intellectual property rights from Welsh universities. As the first step in this process, universities can currently obtain a grant towards the cost of protecting their intellectual property rights. This grant will help speed up the patenting process, providing assistance on matters such as the registration of patents.

Glyn Davies: The biggest threat to the intellectual property of small and medium-sized enterprises is the movement out of key personnel. What discussions have you had with employers—through the Confederation of British Industry or the Federation of Small Businesses—on introducing guidelines on developing employment contracts?

Andrew Davies: One problem that we have had in Wales is the failure to exploit the intellectual property of individuals, universities and companies. We are still in the early days. Speaking via satellite link at the conference in the Celtic Manor Hotel in early April, Professor Michael Porter identified that failure as a weakness. We also identified that as a weakness in 'A Winning Wales'. We will discuss with the Welsh

Gofynnwyd i Eiddo Deallusol Cymru ymuno â rhwydwaith arloeswyr Cymru, ac mae trafodaethau'n parhau ynghylch y modd y gellid defnyddio'r cynllun er budd unigolion yn ogystal â busnesau bach a chanolig eu maint. Ailddynodi Arian Loteri Reclassifying Lottery Funds

C5 Dafydd Wigley: Sut y bydd ailddynodi arian loteri fel arian o'r sector cyhoeddus yn effeithio ar brosiectau sy'n anelu at hyrwyddo twristiaeth yng Nghymru? (OAQ17192)

Andrew Davies: As you know, the Department of Trade and Industry has confirmed that lottery funds should be treated as state resources, and the European Commission has endorsed that view. The guidelines covering the Wales Tourist Board's capital grants scheme contain several delegations, one of which is that the WTB should not provide funding to a private sector project if the total contribution from public funds would exceed 50 per cent of eligible costs. Lottery funding will therefore count against this 50 per cent public sector limit. However, this is a delegated limit which the WTB may exceed with Assembly approval.

Dafydd Wigley: A wnaiff y Gweinidog gadarnhau na ddylai cais am arian gan fenter sector preifat nad yw'n gwneud elw ddod o fewn rheolau cymorth gwladol y Comisiwn Ewropeaidd? A ddywed wrth y Cynulliad a oes unrhyw brosiectau yng Nghymru dan fygythiad oherwydd y newid hwn, ac a oes unrhyw newyddion pellach ynglŷn â chynllun Doc Fictoria yng Nghaernarfon?

Andrew Davies: As Dafydd knows, I took up this matter as soon as it was raised with me. It was also raised with Jenny Randerson. I have arranged for all public bodies in Wales to be informed of the commission's view on this. We only became aware of this issue

Q5 Dafydd Wigley: How will reclassifying lottery funds as public sector funds impact on projects aimed at promoting tourism in Wales? (OAQ17192)

Andrew Davies: Fel y gwyddoch, mae'r Adran Masnach a Diwydiant wedi cadarnhau y dylid trin arian loteri fel adnoddau gwladol, ac mae'r Comisiwn Ewropeaidd wedi ategu'r farn honno. Mae'r canllawiau sy'n ymwneud â chynllun grantiau cyfalafl Bwrdd Croeso Cymru'n cynnwys sawl dirprwyad, ac un ohonynt yw na ddylai Bwrdd Croeso Cymru ddarparu arian i brosiect sector preifat os byddai cyfanswm y cyfraniad o gronfeydd cyhoeddus yn fwy na 50 y cant o'r costau cymwys. Felly bydd arian loteri'n cyfrif yn erbyn y cyfyngiad sector cyhoeddus hwn o 50 y cant. Fodd bynnag, cyfyngiad dirprwyedig yw hwn y caiff Bwrdd Croeso Cymru fynd heibio iddo os yw'r Cynulliad yn cymeradwyo hynny.

Dafydd Wigley: Will the Minister confirm that a funding application from a non-profit making private sector enterprise should not be subject to the European Commission's state aid rules? Will he tell the Assembly whether any projects in Wales are under threat as a result of this change, and does he have any further information regarding the Victoria Dock project in Caernarfon?

Andrew Davies: Fel y gŵyr Dafydd, ymgymerais â'r mater hwn cyn gynted ag y'i codwyd gyda mi. Fe'i codwyd hefyd gyda Jenny Randerson. Yr wyf wedi trefnu i'r holl gyrrff cyhoeddus yng Nghymru gael eu hysbysu o farn y comisiwn ar hyn. Yr oedd

regarding lottery funds very late in the day. Assembly Government officials met with the Department of Trade and Industry on 19 April, when it confirmed the commission's express view that lottery funds will be counted as public money. That has been confirmed by the European Commission.

On the Victoria Dock arts project, I will need to consider and come back to you on that. I have issued instructions, through officials, informing all Assembly sponsored public bodies of the new ruling about the use of lottery funds.

Eleanor Burnham: A gytunwch ei bod yn hanfodol symleiddio'r broses o gael mynediad at arian loteri? A allwch ddweud faint o'r arian hwnnw a fuddsoddwyd yng ngogledd Cymru yn ystod y flwyddyn ddiwethaf?

Andrew Davies: I agree that we should simplify the process. The perceived complexity of the process is a challenge faced by all applicants for structural fund programmes. I have worked with officials, and the Welsh European Funding Office in particular, to cut back on the perceived complexities and the red tape of the system. I do not have the figures on regional structural fund allocations to hand, but I will write to you with that information.

William Graham: You will know that lottery money for good causes was promoted as being separate and in addition to any financial support received from the Government. Has this policy now changed, and, if so, how many other areas of the Welsh economy, such as tourism, will be penalised?

Andrew Davies: As I said in my reply to Dafydd, we only became aware of this ruling late in the day. We must take stock of the implications, not only for structural funds but also for any other way that lottery money is used for public projects. I have asked officials to do that and to report back on all the implications for all the projects and programmes for which we are responsible.

Eleanor Burnham: Do you agree that it is essential to simplify the process of accessing lottery money? Can you tell us how much lottery money has been invested in north Wales over the past year?

Andrew Davies: Cytunaf y dylem symleiddio'r broses. Mae'r cymhlethdod a welir yn y broses yn her a wynebir gan bawb sy'n ymgeisio i raglenni'r cronfeydd strwythurol. Yr wyf wedi gweithio gyda'r swyddogion, a chyda Swyddfa Cyllid Ewropeaidd Cymru'n benodol, i leihau'r cymhlethdod canfyddedig a'r fiwrocratiaeth yn y system. Diwydiant Aerofod yng Nghanol De Cymru Aerospace Industry in South Wales Central

Q6 David Melding: What provision for financial assistance will be made available to the aerospace industry in South Wales Central? (OAQ17111)

Andrew Davies: The First Minister launched Aerospace Wales, as a representative forum for the aerospace industry, on 26 March. The Assembly Government believes the industry is of major strategic importance to Wales and a major contributor to the economy and quality of employment. It is for the sector to come forward with its vision of how it needs to develop, and Aerospace Wales will be developing its strategy for the industry. Once the strategy is ready, we will consider what financial and other assistance the Assembly Government can give.

David Melding: You will know that the Vale of Glamorgan has an outstanding record in aerospace work, particularly maintenance. The developments that may take place at RAF St Athan in conjunction with the Defence Aviation Repair Agency and the Welsh Development Agency, if they lead to strengthening the industry, are welcome. However, do you agree that local concerns must be recognised, particularly if a runway extension will be necessary?

Andrew Davies: Yes, of course. All these developments, particularly the major ones that you talk about, require us to balance and take into account all the considerations. The development at St Athan will have an economic impact, but there are local concerns. All those factors will be taken into account when making a final decision.

Helen Mary Jones: Given what you have just said about the importance of the aerospace industry across Wales, and following the announcement on Monday of the loss of almost 300 aerospace jobs at CF Taylor in Llanelli, have you had discussions with the American parent company, BE Aerospace, with a view to exploring options,

Andrew Davies: As you are aware, we are due to meet later today, following your request. I always have an open door policy, as the Presiding Officer and other Members have publicly acknowledged. I will meet Members when issues clearly affect their constituencies; I make that commitment. Officials have been considering this matter, and are looking at ways to either help the company directly, or the workforce in terms of redeployment and re-employment. However, perhaps we could discuss those issues later.

Mick Bates: You will be aware that an aerospace company in my constituency recently closed, with the loss of 60 jobs. I applaud the establishment of Aerospace Wales, and the strategy that it will produce. However, can the Government take interim measures to ensure that extra resources are made available to these companies to see them through the current down-turn in the aerospace industry, which will certainly pick up in the next 18 months?

Andrew Davies: Whenever a company is in difficulty we, working with the Welsh Development Agency, will give whatever support we can within European state aid rules and other regulations. We will help both companies and employees in that way. In an earlier answer, I indicated the record levels of regional selective assistance this year, and the First Minister and I launched last month the Assembly investment grant for small and medium-sized enterprises, which will provide financial assistance. A range of packages offering financial support is available through Finance Wales and other agencies, and the WDA and other agencies provide business support. The events of 11 September had a major impact on the aerospace industry. Latest indications show that that was a blip and that there is now an upturn. Virgin

I also attended part of the Business Partnership Council's last meeting and heard the CBI provide its assessment of the current state of trade in Wales.

Glyn Davies: Any success achieved by the Government of Wales or the United Kingdom Government depends on maintaining the dynamic successful low tax regime put in place by the Conservative Governments of the 1980s and 1990s—[*Interruption.*]

Q1 Janice Gregory: What level of additional funding will the Minister be making available for the national health service in Wales as a result of the recent UK budget? (OAQ17188)

The Minister for Finance, Local Government and Communities (Edwina Hart): I indicated in my statement on 18 April that the Chancellor's announcement means that there will be new money for new and better ways of improving health for the people of Wales. We will look at our spending allocations during the budget planning round.

Janice Gregory: Do you recognise that the impact would be greatest in areas of highest deprivation such as the south Wales Valleys, which have chronic structural, environmental and social problems? Will you take those problems into account during the budget round?

Edwina Hart: I have asked various Ministers to consider their priority areas, and areas of social deprivation are certainly priority areas. We have done much work on the health side of this in the Townsend report and want further allocations to be made on the basis of that. However, we must recognise that we must drive for an anti-poverty agenda and allocation of funds from the National Assembly.

David Lloyd: I will help the Minister with some figures. Paul Murphy, the Secretary of State, said in last Wednesday's meeting of the Welsh Grand Committee,

Edwina Hart: There is a price for democracy, Nick, and the Government of Wales must receive adequate information in order to make its decisions. It was necessary to ensure that the Assembly receives a proper service from civil servants in terms of how we need to deal with issues. The two matters are not linked. I am aware of these education issues as the Minister for Education and Lifelong Learning has raised them with me.

Edwina Hart: Mae pris i'w dalu am ddemocratiaeth, Nick, a rhaid i Lywodraeth Cymru gael gwybodaeth ddigonol er mwyn gwneud ei phenderfyniadau. He said that if Wales wanted to match the percentage growth of the United Kingdom in health terms, it could find the extra money from the Welsh block. If that is the case, which services will lose money from the block?

Q3 Janet Ryder: Will the Minister make a statement on the UK budget's impact on Assembly Government policies? (OAQ17175)

Edwina Hart: I have made a written statement on the budget, which was excellent news for Wales. The measures contained in the budget are fully consistent with the aims set out in 'A Winning Wales', which encourages entrepreneurship, innovation, supporting business, setting a fresh direction, developing the learning country and, in particular, helping to create strong communities.

Janet Ryder: Further to your previous answers, are you saying that Paul Murphy was wrong, and that the extra £128 million will not be going into the NHS this year?

Edwina Hart: Decisions on the budget will be made by the National Assembly for Wales. As a Labour Minister listening to the opposition parties, I sometimes think that I am the only one in favour of devolution. As committed devolutionists, we make our own decisions on budget. That is what life has always been about for us.

David Davies: I have no doubt that we can expect a raft of announcements soon on how the budget will put more money into schools or hospitals, for example. However, you cannot ensure that this money will go into those services because it will simply be handed over to the local authorities. Do you think that it would be more honest to stop making these announcements until you have followed my colleague's advice and ringfenced the money to ensure that it gets to where it supposed to go?

Edwina Hart: Local democracy is about local government taking decisions. Local government is accountable to its electorate. Devolution is about devolving powers to Wales, and devolving powers to local government. As a democrat, I fully support that line, and will not be hypothecating the main settlements to local government.

There has been some work undertaken on this matter in Scotland, and I have ongoing discussions with the trade union movement: in fact I met with officials from Unison yesterday.

Jonathan Morgan: Despite the constant ramblings of those sitting on the far left of the Chamber, do you agree that private finance initiative provides an excellent opportunity for schools throughout Wales,

Janet Davies: Recalling difficulties in obtaining up-to-date accounts regularly from the Centre for Visual Arts and Coleg Gwent, which both count as Assembly sponsored public bodies, how do you propose to embed these procedures deeply, so that they cannot be ignored in future?

Edwina Hart: I hope that they will not be ignored in future, and that they are well embedded. In light of your question, I will now write to my colleagues in ASPBs and, as part of their remit of responsibility, suggest that they raise these matters with ASPBs to ensure transparency when handling issues.

William Graham: The Auditor General for Wales recently raised concerns over the

This Government has always considered the performance of our key services as part and parcel of allocating money. We must invest in strategies that are designed to achieve exactly that, and it should be integral to the allocation of new funds.

Alun Cairns: How does the Minister account for the fact that spending on health has increased by some 25 per cent, but that the number of operations has only increased by 2 per cent? Furthermore, the increase in national insurance contributions in the Chancellor's budget will pose an enormous burden on the public sector wage bill—an additional £15 million in the health service alone, and over £50 million sponsored directly from the Assembly. Which services will be cut and how does she account for those?

Edwina Hart: I considered the national insurance issues further to the announcement, particularly in light of the responsibilities of the National Assembly and Assembly sponsored public bodies. It is important to recognise that the Chancellor's budget was well rounded, and that the national insurance rises were taken in the round. There is a balance in the additional resources that he has allocated to the health service, which I will

Glyn Davies: Minister, earlier the Minister for Economic Development refused to answer my question about the effects of the Chancellor's tax-raising budget on jobs. He usually prefers to rely on a prepared answer.

Q8 Rhodri Glyn Thomas: How does the Minister monitor the budget to ensure the best possible value for money for the people of Wales? (OAQ17182)

The Minister for Economic Development (Andrew Davies): It is with great disappointment that I make this statement. The numbers may speak for themselves—some 1,000 employees in Pembroke Dock have lost their jobs—but I am sure that our first thoughts are with the families and employees who have been severely affected. I empathise with their disappointment and frustration. They have done their jobs exceptionally well and have lost them through no fault of their own. They have lived through the uncertainties of the past weeks and have never been less than fully committed. In turn, I am fully committed to ensuring that their loss of employment is kept as short as humanly possible. The Welsh Assembly Government has already attracted major employment to Pembroke Dock; we have done it once and we will do it again.

The Welsh Assembly Government and its Team Wales partners provided financial and other support to assist Manpower and 7C to come to Pembroke Dock. The employment prospects were regarded as sound given that the service being provided was for ITV Digital. The commercial difficulties of ITV Digital have been discussed extensively in the media and I will not discuss them now. However, it is worth emphasising that the

Edwina Hart: Yr ydym yn cydnabod y bydd cyfraniad yswiriant gwladol y cyflogwyr yn cael effaith ar gostau busnes. Fodd bynnag, fe wrthbwysir hynny gan dreth gorfforaeth is i fusnesau bach a chanolig eu maint.

Y Gweinidog dros Ddatblygu Economaidd (Andrew Davies): Yr wyf yn teimlo siom mawr wrth wneud y datganiad hwn. Mae'r niferoedd yn siarad drostynt eu hunain—mae oddeutu 1,000 o weithwyr yn Noc Penfro wedi colli'u swyddi—ond yr wyf yn siŵr mai'r teuluoedd a'r gweithwyr a effeithiwyd yn ddifrifol sydd ym mlaen ein meddwl. Yr wyf yn deall eu siom a'u rhwystredigaeth. Gwnaethant eu swyddi'n eithriadol o dda ac maent wedi'u colli heb fod unrhyw fai arnynt hwy. Maent wedi byw drwy ansierwydd yr wythnosau diwethaf hyn ac wedi bod yn llwyr ymroddedig ar hyd yr amser. Yr wyf fi, yn fy nhro, yn gwbl ymroddedig i sierhau y bydd eu cyfnod heb waith mor fyr ag y bo modd. Mae Llywodraeth Cynulliad Cymru wedi denu nifer fawr o swyddi i Ddoc Penfro eisoes; gwnaethom hynny unwaith ac fe'i gwnawn eto.

Rhoddyd cymorth ariannol a chymorth arall gan Lywodraeth Cynulliad Cymru a'i phartneriaid yn Nhîm Cymru i helpu Manpower a 7C i ddod i Ddoc Penfro. Yr oedd y rhagolygon am waith yn cael eu hystyried yn rhai da gan mai i ITV Digital y darperid y gwasanaeth. Bu trafodaeth helaeth yn y cyfryngau ar anawsterau masnachol ITV Digital ac nis trafodaf yn awr. Fodd bynnag, mae'n werth pwysleisio bod y cyfleuster a'r

facility and staff in Pembroke Dock are regarded as excellent. There are good prospects of re-building employment at the facility to at least the levels that prevailed before the difficulties of ITV Digital.

It saddens me to confirm that Manpower and 7C—the companies that supplied the customer contact services for ITV Digital—have issued redundancy notices to all their staff in Pembroke Dock. The notices are for one week or one month, depending on the employment contracts, but the companies do not expect staff to attend today. The companies have commended the excellent support that they have enjoyed from their staff and the wider community, even through the unsettling and uncertain times. Nevertheless, the companies considered that they had no choice but to make staff redundant in view of the administrators' announcement that no buyer had been found for ITV Digital.

As far as future digital services are concerned, there will be a six-week period for new interests in the licence to bid. However, we are not waiting to see whether a successful tenderer might want customer support services from Pembroke Dock. We had already begun contingency work to promote the centre to other clients. Ending the exclusive contract between Manpower, 7C and ITV Digital enables all concerned to set to the task without constraint.

On Monday this week I held a meeting with Manpower, 7C, my Assembly colleague Christine Gwyther, the Members of Parliament concerned, the Team Wales agencies, the trade unions, and representatives from Pembrokeshire County Council. We agreed to set up an action group to provide not only for the short-term needs of employees in terms of employment benefits and training, but also to co-ordinate the attraction of replacement business. This is a team approach, but I will single out one person, and commend Christine Gwyther, the local Assembly Member, for her tireless efforts on behalf of her constituents. The people of Carmarthen West and South Pembrokeshire are well served by their

O ran gwasanaethau digidol yn y dyfodol, bydd cyfnod o chwe wythnos i dderbyn ceisiadau gan rai sy'n ymddiddori yn y drwydded o'r newydd. Fodd bynnag, nid ydym yn disgwyl i weld a allai tendrwr llwyddiannus ddymuno cael gwasanaethau cymorth cwsmeriaid yn Noc Penfro. Yr oeddem eisoes wedi dechrau gwaith wrth gefn i hyrwyddo'r ganolfan ymysg cleientiaid eraill. Mae terfynu'r contract cyfyngol rhwng Manpower, 7C ac ITV Digital yn galluogi pawb sy'n gysylltiedig i fynd ynghylch y gwaith yn ddiymatal.

Ar ddydd Llun yr wythnos yma cynhaliais gyfarfod gyda Manpower, 7C, fy nghyd-aelod yn y Cynulliad Christine Gwyther, yr Aelodau Seneddol sy'n gysylltiedig, asiantaethau Tîm Cymru, yr undebau llafur, a chynrychiolwyr o Gyngor Sir Benfro. Cytunasom i sefydlu grŵp gweithredu i ddarparu nid yn unig ar gyfer anghenion tymor byr y gweithwyr o ran budd-daliadau cyflogaeth a hyfforddi, ond hefyd i gydlynú'r gwaith o ddenu busnes yn ei le. Assembly Member. Manpower and 7C are actively trying to attract other customer relationship business on the basis of the excellent facility and workforce. I intend to meet Iain Herbertson, the managing director of Manpower, at the facility in Pembroke Dock on Saturday. I am also in contact with the Secretary of State for Wales to use his good offices to see whether there is any customer relation work for the UK Government, which could make use of Pembroke Dock. We are making a similar inquiry of our own business and that of Assembly sponsored public bodies in Wales. The WDA is also pursuing a number of leads.

I have made it clear that any prospective user of the centre would have the full support of the Welsh Assembly Government and Team Wales. That includes practical assistance ranging from our willingness to consider regional selective assistance for eligible projects to facilitating visits by prospective investors. We have also co-operated with Manpower and 7C on putting together an effective promotion for their prospective clients. The Welsh Assembly Government and its partners are doing everything that is humanly possible to tackle this major job loss in Pembrokeshire. We have the services and support, the contacts and the marketing; the vital element is to co-ordinate them.

I have asked the WDA to provide a project director to work with the action group and to report directly to me. I shall take a personal role in ensuring a co-ordinated and effective response to this situation. I am heartened that we are dealing with a growth sector in the UK and in Wales and I am clear, at this stage, that our priorities are: to replace the jobs lost; to bring the Cleddau centre up to capacity, and to support the people who have been made redundant. We have every chance of winning business to replace what was lost with the demise of ITV Digital, and I assure you that every effort will be made to convert chances into outcomes.

hopes when the First Minister opened this site less than a year ago. It is a disastrous blow for Pembrokeshire and the south west in general. A thousand people were directly affected by this, but there will be an indirect effect on others, for example Infotech in Neyland, which trains employees for this centre, local bus firms which take people to work every day, as well as other businesses.

Does the Minister have any estimate of the total loss to the local economy beyond the 1,000 job losses? Will those people who are being made redundant receive redundancy pay given that they have been in their jobs for less than two years?

Nick Ainger stated on radio this morning that there would be the immediate possibility of new contracts. Does the Minister know as much as Nick Ainger, or more than that? Can we have details on the short-term prospects? Will the Minister go further and recognise the special needs of Pembrokeshire? It is a post-industrial area that has suffered a series of blows over the last 10 to 15 years. It lost large parts of the defence industry, agriculture is under a great deal of pressure and tourism has suffered over the last few years as a result of foot and mouth disease and, generally, because of the strength of the pound. Will he accept that these redundancies are proportionate to the losses in the steel industry and that we need an integrated strategy and a financial package to tackle the challenge and opportunities in Pembrokeshire? I strongly feel that the area has a great potential. Will the Minister accept the need to set targets for creating jobs in the area beyond these 1,000 additional jobs? He expressed confidence that it will be possible to create those additional jobs, but on what basis is he so confident that 1,000 new jobs can be created to replace those that were lost?

How does he intend to tackle the issue of establishing a wider and more secure foundation in Pembrokeshire? He mentioned an action group and a project director: that is needed. However, some of us remember

Andrew Davies: You have asked several specific questions. I have asked the task group and the project director to report to me and officials about the wider implication in terms of the effect on the local economy. I am sure that we all heard on radio this morning about people who are indirectly affected by the job losses and the effects on their businesses. We need to quantify that.

I will also ask officials, who I am sure will be watching and will already be making inquiries into the situation, about redundancy entitlement.

Unemployment in Pembrokeshire is above the Welsh average, as was noted earlier, but it has decreased significantly—probably faster in Pembrokeshire than in many other parts of Wales—because of the employment provided by ITV Digital. That is why the impact, as well as being personal, will affect the economy. We are taking the issue seriously and I have taken personal charge of the situation.

There are significant differences between the current redundancies and those experienced at Corus. In employment terms, although the steel industry is a modern, highly technological, proficient and efficient industry—as we are all aware—it has experienced significant decline over many years. The call centre sector is quite buoyant

David Hunt's taskforce 10 years ago in Pembrokeshire, which was a totally cosmetic exercise that had no significant effect on an area that was under pressure at that time. What package of financial assistance does he therefore have in mind given that an area which suffered because of steelwork closures received assistance of £90 million? Does he have a figure in mind?

Will he give information about broadband in Pembrokeshire? I understand that broadband will reach Haverfordwest. What plans are there to ensure that that is extended further? This is one essential element of the infrastructure of an area such as Pembrokeshire that would form a basis for further industrial and economic development.

Andrew Davies: Yr ydych wedi gofyn sawl cwestiwn penodol. Yr wyf wedi gofyn i'r grŵp gorchwyl a'r cyfarwyddwr prosiect adrodd i mi a'r swyddogion am y goblygiadau ehangach o ran yr effaith ar yr economi leol. That is why we are quietly confident that we will be able to bring alternative operators to the Pembroke Dock facility. The facility at Pembroke Dock, and the expertise provided by the workforce, have been universally applauded, including ITV Digital, and the employers, Manpower and 7C. Everybody recognises that it was a highly committed, motivated and skilled workforce. The average age of the workforce is 26 and they are well trained. Their training issues are different from those of Corus workers. We have not ruled out financial support or a financial package. However, as with the Corus announcement, we were unable to announce a financial package at a similar stage because we needed to take stock of the situation. We will consider the request for additional financial resources if it proves necessary. The First Minister and I are confident that, given the level of interest in call centres in general, and particularly in the facility in Pembroke Dock, alternative operators will be found. At this stage, it would be inappropriate for me to confirm or deny any specific contacts or job offers from operators. The WDA, my officials and others are closely considering a range of offers. Therefore, at this stage, it would not be appropriate for me to confirm or deny any specific offers.

I have answered your question on broadband previously. In November 2001, I announced the establishment of the lifelong learning network based on broadband, which formed a high-speed internet access point for every local authority, including Pembrokeshire. It has been phenomenally successful. We have had discussions with major IT companies, who recognise that Wales is well ahead of other parts of the UK in terms of the lifelong learning network and our exploitation of broadband. Given the market weaknesses and deficiencies, I plan to make a major announcement in the near future on the wider issue of broadband in Wales and on the implementation of the analysis report, which I hope will support areas such as

Christine Gwyther: It has been a difficult 48 hours for my constituents and I could use all of my allotted time talking about how Pembroke Dock and the surrounding area is coming to terms with the news that 1,045 jobs have been lost overnight. There is shock, because who would have believed that a company supported by the TV giants, Carlton and Granada, could be anything but safe? There is anger, because the brinkmanship negotiations between ITV Digital and the Football League clearly paid no heed to the human cost of their financial squabbling. Over a thousand families in my area are directly affected. As my colleague, Cynog Dafis, said earlier, many hundreds more spin-off jobs are already at risk. One long-in-the-tooth union official, accustomed to industrial battles, phoned me on Tuesday night to say that he had just had the worst day of his professional life, comforting men and women who, up until then, had been working, training and learning hard, building careers and a reputation for excellence at the Pembroke Dock call centre. All that hard work came crashing down at 2.20 p.m. on Tuesday when ITV Digital—without warning—pulled the plug on Pembroke Dock; phones and computers were disconnected remotely.

It is a testament to the remarkable professionalism of that workforce that their first thought was for the customers who would not now be able to get through. It is exactly that kind of professionalism and commitment that Wales cannot afford to throw away. As Andrew Davies said, the average age of the workforce at the call centre is 26. They are loyal, committed and trained to the top of their profession, making their careers in a sunshine industry within their own community. It is the stuff that our national economic strategy is made of. Now, like the Government, I hope that customers will emerge to take up the offer of a world-class workforce and world-class facilities in a world-class location. The expressions of interest are pouring in. They are even pouring in to me as an ordinary Assembly Member. If the announcement of 50 to 70 temporary jobs

Will the WDA take a lead, and how far will it trawl for business? What special training can Education and Learning Wales provide so that the call centre workers can be ready for different kinds of call centre jobs, such as financial services, if they are required by new customers? How can we protect against having all our eggs in one basket? Can we spread the risk by having a varied portfolio of customers? I hope that you can provide some of the answers to these immediate questions; I am sure that there will be more as the weeks progress.

Finally, I thank you and the First Minister, for the practical and moral support that you have given so far to my constituents. I assure you that it is well placed, and I hope that I can continue to count on it.

Andrew Davies: To clarify some of the points that I made in my statement, in terms of the public sector, I have taken charge of dealing with ITV Digital's demise and its effects in Pembroke Dock. As you are aware, the key stakeholders met on Monday. As I said in my statement, my role is to help to co-ordinate the work, and to give it direction. That is why I have asked the WDA to appoint a taskforce director to bring all the agencies together and provide that much needed focus. I hope that that will reassure you. On looking for alternative business, there have been quite extensive expressions of interest from a range of operators who were already considering locating in Wales. As you said, the facility in Pembroke Dock is world class, which I think that everybody recognises. It has a committed and well-trained workforce, and others will be interested in the facility. That is why we

On your question about putting all our eggs in one basket, one problem was that ITV Digital insisted on an exclusivity deal with Manpower and 7C on the operation at Pembroke Dock. There were discussions before ITV Digital's problems on enhancing the facility, and erecting a third building. I hope that, in the longer term, we will proceed with that project. The call centre industry will see the quality of what is on offer in Pembroke Dock and will want to locate there. We have graphically seen the dangers of having just one operator, and we would ideally want a range of operators. However, if a single operator were to offer around 1,000 jobs, I do not think that the Assembly Government, Manpower, 7C, or your constituents would want to reject the offer out of hand; however, we would need to carefully consider its implications.

Alun Cairns: I empathise with those people who have lost their jobs, and support many of the comments made by other Assembly Members. The loss of 1,000 jobs in one county such as this can easily be compared with the recent 3,000 job losses in Corus. This loss is focused in an area where the three traditional industries—the defence and oil industries, and agriculture—are in decline. The loss of these jobs, which the county had attracted through diversification, will be a body blow to the economy. This raises questions about overdependence on certain industries. At the Economic Development Committee meeting last week, your report highlighted seven call centres in different

These are welcome in terms of potential diversification from manufacturing into the service industry—and I support the role of call centres—but an over dependence on one industry or on one company, such as ITV Digital in this case, can create longer term structural problems if we are not careful.

Given the comparisons that we have made with Corus, and the launch of the five counties regeneration strategy, and your answer to Cynog Dafis that it is premature to introduce a project on a similar basis, when can we expect you to make a decision on the scale of financial support that you will offer, and the form of your strategy? The people of Pembrokeshire will expect something comparable with the five counties regeneration strategy, because of structural unemployment and the decline of Pembrokeshire's three major industries. I do not accept that structural unemployment in south-east Wales is different to structural unemployment in Pembrokeshire. In south-east Wales, Newport and Cardiff are within relatively short distances of the areas affected by the Corus job losses. They are currently boom cities, where the gross domestic product per capita is in excess of the UK average. The same cannot be said for Pembrokeshire. In south-east Wales, GDP per capita is 102 per cent of the UK average; that is not the case in west Wales and Pembrokeshire.

I note that the First Minister questioned what I said. I hope that his support for the west-Wales economy will be comparable to the support given to the Valleys and the south-Wales economy following the redundancies at Corus.

I will underline a few more important points. Nick Ainger, the MP for the Carmarthen West and South Pembrokeshire, announced possible good news this morning. On what basis did he make that announcement, and when can the Minister provide further details about that potentially good news of some further employment prospects being created, either at the call centre or in Pembrokeshire? How much regional selective assistance was

I am pleased to hear that discussions are ongoing, and I support you in that. Will you involve every Assembly Member who represents Pembrokeshire, that is, all the regional Members, as well as the constituency Member? Excellent work has been carried out thus far, and I hope that you will not show prejudice, and will include all Assembly Members.

Andrew Davies: There are huge problems if you become overdependent on one sector. That has been a fundamental problem for the Welsh economy. Traditionally, it was based on coal, steel, heavy industry and agriculture. Most of those industries are in decline in terms of the numbers of people employed by them. The ITV Digital service in Pembroke Dock is a more local case of one industry or employer being overly dominant. We need a more diversified economy locally, and throughout Wales, to avoid that problem. However, to put it in perspective, the call centre sector, as I said earlier, is a growing sector of employment. Having said that—and you mentioned RSA grants and the report in the Economic Development Committee meeting last week—call centres employ just 2.5 per cent of the workforce in Wales. We must keep this in proportion. However, the jobs in Pembroke Dock were a godsend for local people. You only had to hear them talking on the radio this morning to know how committed the workforce was. It felt valued and was making a major contribution to the economy. It is a huge shock for those people and the local economy.

If one or more operators take over the operation at Pembroke Dock, then the impact will be short-term. We still regret it, but it will be short-term, in which case a significant package such as the one following the redundancies at Corus may not be needed. The Corus package demonstrates that when the need arose, the Welsh Assembly Government was able to respond with great speed. Over half of the workers who were made redundant in Corus are now in alternative employment or high quality training projects.

Manpower was granted RSA to help create up to 349 jobs. That figure was exceeded. We need to consider the conditions in detail, and the WDA and my officials are currently doing that. It is too soon for me to comment on that. chance of getting the money back—and I would not want to either, at the rate things are going.

I thank Andrew for his statement, because this is a major blow to a fragile economy. It is fragile because it depends on a small number of large employers and it is distant from the market. This call centre was to have been the new hope for the area.

The most harrowing comments that I have heard about this tragedy in recent days were from people in Pembroke Dock, who said that the economy was turning up, things were looking better, people had more confidence and were starting to look to the future and now all that has been dashed. Perhaps part of the problem that we have faced in all parts of Wales, but particularly in this fragile economy, relates to having the confidence that allows you to take on adversity. I hope that people can retain some of that confidence in the difficult time ahead.

I have some questions about your statement. You talked about the attitude of Manpower and 7C, and said that you were saddened that they have issued redundancy notices to all their staff. In your discussions with Manpower and 7C, have you addressed the period of the redundancy notices issued and their timing? There seems to be some criticism of those companies in your statement.

It is right, as you said, to pause to consider the right amount and nature of public investment and support for the area, but can you guarantee that, if that help is needed, it will be made available? We all heard Nick Ainger MP's statement this morning, and I presume that there will be an announcement of some jobs today. We can only speculate as to whether they will be temporary or few in number. Would it be possible to divide up the existing building, which has space for 1,000 people, if an employer sought to use part of it? Is that a realistic option or are the present owners, and those who are seeking new employers for the area, looking for a single employer to occupy the whole building? What are the prospects of that site being

In conclusion, I place on record our sympathy for the many people seeking work in an area that has only one other large employer that pays good wages. We sympathise with them in this tragedy and those difficulties and hope that the situation will be resolved as swiftly as possible. I look forward to you confirming that you are doing everything possible to ensure that it will be rectified as quickly as possible.

Andrew Davies: All Members would agree with those sentiments; our thoughts, best wishes and support go to all those affected by ITV Digital's decision. You are right about the confidence factor. It was alluded to in a report on the radio this morning, which I am sure many Members heard. People had had more hope and confidence about the future. I hope that, working with local representatives, public agencies and the Westminster Government, we can restore that confidence as soon as possible.

Manpower and 7C faced a difficult financial position, given that ITV Digital pulled the plug on their operations. We had hoped that the digital service could have been maintained while another broadcaster or operator came into the frame. It would, therefore, have been a case of temporary layoffs rather than redundancies. Once ITV Digital had pulled the plug, Manpower and 7C had little choice other than to issue redundancy notices of a week or a month, depending on the contracts. I did not intend to imply any criticism of Manpower and 7C, as they faced a difficult financial position. As a Government, we would not have been in a position to offer financial support to them, as it would probably have contravened European state aid rules.

I put on record again that we have not ruled out a financial package, if it proves necessary. However, we need to consider the issue in the round, including the implications in terms of the training and other support that may be needed for those made redundant. I have already started to discuss this issue with

That is my understanding and that is the basis on which the WDA, Manpower and 7C are operating.

The Presiding Officer: We have exceeded the 30 minutes allocated for this statement because of the importance of the issue. As I have now called all leading spokespeople, I ask for brevity in both questions and answers. In view of the importance of the issue, I will extend the time for this statement by a further 10 minutes.

Andrew Davies: What happened with ITV Digital was an example of us operating in a

Do you accept that this Government does not have much luck with call centres, given that this centre in Pembroke Dock closed after a year, and that no jobs have been created or calls made in the BT call centre in Nantgarw, which was announced by the First Minister? We also heard yesterday that a third of the jobs in a call centre in Cardigan, which was opened by the First Minister, are under threat. I accept that there is a place for call centres in the Welsh economy, but do you accept that such jobs can be vulnerable, as contracts can disappear overnight and jobs relocated elsewhere? How can the Government ensure that any regional selective assistance expenditure on call centres is given on the basis that the jobs will be long-term ones, given that this sector is so vulnerable and sensitive to change? That would benefit people in Pembroke Dock, and employees in other call centres.

global economy, over which Governments—be they at the Assembly or in Westminster—have little control. Carlton, Granada and ITV Digital made a commercial decision to enter into a deal with the football league. The failure of that deal to prove profitable led to the impact on employees in Pembroke Dock that we have seen only too graphically. However, it is not only the call centre sector that is vulnerable in a global economy. We have seen this happen in a range of industries and sectors. Companies must make decisions in terms of the impact of global movements. We have seen that happen in the manufacturing sector, for example. Call centres are no more vulnerable than any other sector. Certainly, no blame can be attached to the employees at Pembroke Dock. It is through no fault of their own, nor of any public agency in Wales—including the Welsh Assembly Government—that these redundancies have occurred.

On RSA, we cannot guarantee, in a global market economy, a long-term successful outcome for any business. Success is down to the operation of the business itself, as well as the workings of the local, the Welsh and the wider economy. We cannot give a copper-bottom guarantee for success; I wish that we could. Are you asking us, as the Government, to state that we will not consider giving RSA to call centres? Are you asking us to refuse to give RSA, should a call centre operator come forward wanting to expand the business at Pembroke Dock? I am sure that the people of Pembroke Dock, Pembrokeshire or any part of Wales with assisted area status would not welcome that. We must consider any application for RSA on the basis of whether it is a sound business case; we have always done that and always will. As I have said, we had a record year last year in terms of the number of projects awarded grants, as well as the amount of money given in RSA.

Delyth Evans: I commend you, Andrew, and the First Minister on your handling of this difficult situation. Will you join me in condemning the intransigence and greed of Carlton and Granada on the one side, and the football club chairmen on the other? They refused to agree a sensible way through their difficulties, which could have saved the jobs in Pembrokeshire and maintained the digital service to viewers. This was despite the UK Government's best efforts to bring them to a compromise. This regrettable situation is the result of the failure of one company, based on a flawed and inflated contract for football broadcasting rights. It is not the failure of digital terrestrial television, which remains a central plank in the future development of broadcasting in this country. Do you agree that the Pembroke workforce is well placed to service this sector in the future, as well as the customer service sector in general?

Andrew Davies: I regret the decisions made by those companies and the football league, and their failure to reach agreement. The impact has been devastating for those employed at Pembroke Dock. They are pawns in a much bigger game and I do not think that the fate of those employees was uppermost in the minds of Carlton, Granada, ITV Digital or the football league. I find that regrettable. I agree with you that this is not a critique of the plans that we and the Westminster Government have for digital broadcasting growth in television and radio. It is clearly a crucial area. This is a setback, but the long-term future for digital broadcasting is good, and Wales must work hard to exploit the opportunities it offers. Broadcasters in Wales, such as BBC Wales, have imaginative plans for the use of digital television and radio, and some of the independent radio stations, such as my local station in south-west Wales, are looking at the new allocation of licences. It offers huge long-term potential but, as is always the case with new developments and technology, there are short-term problems. However, the prospects for the long-term are sound.

Glyn Davies: I have been closely involved on several occasions in the aftershocks of the loss of large-scale employers in rural Wales. You may well remember, Llywydd, the closure of BRD in Newtown, which transformed the Severn valley for decades. You will certainly remember the closure of Trawsfynydd power station, which had the same effect in north-west Wales. You have spoken of your response, Minister, and I understand that it is not yet a complete response to what has happened. It is equally too soon for us to judge whether your response will be adequate. There must be a team Pembrokeshire approach, led by a well-supported project director, to take advantage of the pool of skilled labour that now exists in Pembrokeshire. Will you accept that we need a significant financial package as a basis for the marketing strategy that will be needed? I understand that you cannot yet identify what that should be. However, it is crucial. You have an important job to do in Pembrokeshire, and I will do whatever I can to help you do it well.

Andrew Davies: Thank you, Glyn. I welcome your response, and that of every Member who has spoken. I am sure that your words represent the views of all Members. We need to respond in a unified way. I mentioned a team Wales approach, but there must obviously be a team Pembrokeshire approach. There is widespread recognition that we must respond imaginatively and proactively to the crisis that has hit the people employed at Pembroke Dock. I put on record again that we have not turned down completely any request for a financial package. We will have to consider that in the round, and it is, as you said, too soon to say. I am heartened by the response of ELWa, the Employment Service and, in particular, the WDA. They have responded to this crisis at a local and an all-Wales level. I am quietly confident that we will be able to turn the situation around and find alternative operators for the centre at Pembroke Dock. If that does not transpire, and wider financial support is required, then, in collaboration with Edwina Hart and the First Minister, and Jane Davidson on training issues, we will respond as we did, successfully, to the

Nick Bourne: I thank the Minister for this appropriately early statement. However, as other Members have said, we may need a further statement, perhaps on the financial package that you have indicated may be forthcoming if the jobs are not made good fairly soon. I would press you on that; you may have gone as far as you can towards making a commitment but, if you could commit to making another statement when circumstances have died down after the first flush of this dreadful announcement, I am sure that all Members would welcome that.

I echo the regret expressed that no agreement was reached with the football league. That is to be much regretted, and we are now seeing its impact in Pembrokeshire. This is the most serious round of job losses that I have seen in my area since becoming an Assembly Member. It even eclipses, and is more serious than, the job losses at Lucas SEI in Ystradgynlais in the Swansea valley, because it affects so many people in the community. All the local Assembly Members and MPs are concerned about that. I welcome your commitment to a team Wales approach and the involvement of all agencies. That must include ELWa, the WDA and Pembrokeshire County Council. I agree with Christine Gwyther and other Members that we need to be wary of putting all our eggs in one basket. Should we be in the wonderful position of having a choice in terms of people being able to take up some of the jobs lost, it would be better that they were diversified into various companies because, as we have seen, there is a danger in one company providing all of the jobs.

Another issue is regional selective assistance. You have indicated that you may make a fuller statement on the position when it has been considered by your officials and the WDA. I welcome that commitment. I do not know whether part of the RSA grant was conditional on an early warning system in relation to job losses, but I encourage you

Where so many jobs are dependent on one employer in an area such as Pembroke Dock, we need an early warning as it could enable us to stave off the losses, provide assistance earlier, and be genuinely proactive. We are not being proactive here, but reactive—although I realise that must be the case in the circumstances. Perhaps RSA could prevent this from happening in future. I want to press you on those matters, Minister, and I particularly want to press you on giving a further statement when things have settled down.

Andrew Davies: I am more than happy to come back with a further statement. I will keep local Members, in particular, updated on an oral or written basis, and I will commit to doing the same with the Assembly in general.

The job losses in Ystradgynlais links, in a way, with what I said earlier on the Corus package, and I do not seek to minimise the impact on employees or communities. The demise of the Tick Tock factory in Ystradgynlais, which was owned by Lucas SEI Wiring Systems Ltd, was interesting in that the closure's impact was relatively short-term. Many of the employees found alternative employment, although, admittedly, it meant commuting to work. By talking to people in banking, for example, and using a team Wales approach, involving the local authorities, the WDA and others, we have succeeded in turning the situation around.

The same is true of the Corus situation, where the Welsh Assembly Government was able to focus on the problem by bringing a number of Ministers together: Jane Davidson; Edwina Hart; Jenny Randerson; Sue Essex, and others under the leadership of the First Minister. This added focus would not have been possible prior to devolution, and we have seen the benefit of this as over half of those made redundant by Corus have now either gained alternative employment or have embarked on good, high-quality training packages.

On Alun Cairns's point, which was a point I omitted to make—and I am not seeking to

That option is severely limited in Pembrokeshire. Swansea, which I represent, is an hour and a half away for those who have been made redundant, and many of them do not have cars because of their low income. Therefore, commuting is not an option in the way that it was for those affected by the Corus announcements. Clearly, in addition to the differences I have already itemised, that is a third major difference of which we should be aware, and of which I am acutely aware.

On RSA, as I said earlier, I am considering the conditions of granting it to Manpower. Clearly, if we succeed in attracting one or more operators to the Pembroke Dock facility, through Manpower, it is likely that the grant conditions will be maintained. The first RSA offer, which has been taken up, was, I believe, on the basis of 349 jobs. They have now exceeded that by a considerable extent, and we will need to look at the conditions relating to that. I will give a full report on the implications in due course. I am hoping that we will not have to consider clawback, and we are quietly confident that we will get one or more operators into Pembroke Dock as soon as possible.

Ieuan Wyn Jones: I thank you for making a statement today because the announcement of 1,000 job losses in an area such as Pembroke Dock is devastating for the community. I have represented a rural area in the National Assembly and elsewhere for many years, and I recognise how difficult it is to attract new jobs to an area such as Pembrokeshire. Other Assembly Members have told you of similar experiences. I am pleased to note that today's statement is bullish in one sense in the fact that you say that the Government has attracted jobs in the past and will do so again. I hope that those high expectations can be fulfilled. People will now expect action to be taken following the statement.

On the role of the Welsh Development Agency, I note from the statement that it is pursuing a number of leads and that you have asked it to provide a project director to work with the action group. I would be disappointed if that were the Welsh Development Agency's only role. Can you confirm that you have had discussions with the chairman and chief executive of the WDA to impress upon the agency the urgency with which it should be fully engaged, alongside your officials, in ensuring that these new jobs come to Pembrokeshire, given its excellent track record in attracting inward investment and other investment of this project's size into Wales.

Andrew Davies: I can give that commitment. The WDA has already made the highest level of commitment in terms of dealing with the situation caused by the demise of ITV Digital. It also assisted with the Corus package, as its director was the WDA's senior executive. It has given the commitment that it will provide the same degree of focus to the demise of ITV Digital and the effects on Pembroke Dock. I am reassured by previous experience and the dynamic working relationship that we have with the WDA that it will bring all the necessary resources to bear at a local and all-Wales level, as it did regarding the Corus redundancy situation. I have seen, from conversations with senior WDA executives that they are committed, as I am, to turning the situation around and attracting alternative operators at Pembroke Dock.

Dafydd Wigley: Pwynt o drefn. Codaf hyn o dan Reol Sefydlog Rhif 1.9, sy'n cyfeirio at gyfrifoldebau'r Llywydd i warchod ein hawliau i gyflawni cyfrifoldebau o fewn terfynau Deddf Llywodraeth Cymru 1998. Codaf hyn yng nghyd-destun y sylwadau a wnaed gan Ysgrifennydd Gwladol Cymru, Paul Murphy, yn yr Uwch Bwyllgor Cymreig ddydd Mercher, 24 Ebrill. Yng nghyd-destun y gyllideb, a dyfynnar ei eiriau o Hansard, dywedodd:

Dafydd Wigley: Point of order. I raise this under Standing Order No. 1.9, which refers to the Presiding Officer's responsibility to protect our rights to carry out responsibilities within the boundaries of the Government of Wales Act 1998. I raise this in the context of comments made by the Secretary of State for Wales, Paul Murphy, in the Welsh Grand Committee on Wednesday, 24 April. In the context of the budget, and I quote from Hansard, he stated:

'Let me remind the Committee what they mean for the Welsh health service. Next year, £128 million extra will go to the NHS; the year after that, £493 million more will be spent than is being spent now.'

Yr oedd yn glir o atebion Edwina Hart, y Gweinidog dros Gyllid, Llywodraeth Leol a Chymunedau, i gwestiynau yn gynharach heddiw, na phenderfynodd y Llywodraeth hyd yma sut y dylid defnyddio'r arian ac na wnaed cyhoeddiad ar y mater. Mae cwestiwn sylfaenol yn codi o hyn. Sut y gall Paul Murphy wneud datganiad yn y Senedd yn Llundain yn nodi'r ffigurau a gaiff eu gwario ar y gwasanaeth iechyd yng Nghymru? Nid wyf yn amau cywirdeb y ffigurau neu a ddylent fod yn fwy neu'n llai, ond yr wyf yn gofyn pa hawl sydd gan Paul Murphy, o dan Ddeddf Llywodraeth Cymru 1998, i wneud gosodiad o'r fath? Mater i Lywodraeth y Cynulliad, sy'n atebol i'r Cynulliad yw dyfarnu ar sut y caiff yr arian ei wario o fewn y bloc Cymreig, ac nid mater i Paul Murphy. It was clear from the answers given by Edwina Hart, the Minister for Finance, Local Government and Communities, to earlier questions today, that the Government had not yet decided how the money should be used and that an announcement had not been made on the issue. A fundamental question arises. How can Paul Murphy make a statement in Parliament in London noting the figures that will be spent on the health service in Wales? I am not disputing the accuracy of the figures or whether they should be larger or smaller, but asking what right does Paul Murphy have, under the Government of Wales Act 1998, to make such a statement? Deciding how the money is spent within the Welsh block is a matter for the Assembly Government, which is accountable to the Assembly, and not a matter for Paul Murphy. I am concerned that this could raise uncertainty among the public as it is unclear who is speaking on this matter when various figures are quoted from different directions. I am also concerned about whether the Secretary of State is trying to ensure that the Assembly is following the policy pattern that is set by the UK Government in London rather than using the Assembly's powers. Presiding Officer, do you have the right under this clause—and I know that protecting the Assembly's rights is an issue that you take seriously—to invite Paul Murphy to the Assembly to answer questions on what he said?

Y Llywydd: Mae gwahoddiad i Ysgrifennydd Gwladol Cymru; yn wir, nid oes rhaid iddo aros am wahoddiad. The Presiding Officer: The Secretary of State for Wales has an invitation; indeed, he does not have to wait for an invitation. He is welcome to come to the Assembly, to its Committees or Plenary sessions, at any time to make a statement on any matter. He is, in a sense, an *ex officio* Assembly member as a consequence of the devolution settlement in the Government of Wales Act 1998.

Nick Bourne: Further to that point of order, this has concerned my group, specifically because it raises expectations among the public that something will happen and it is being pre-empted by Westminster. Given what happened to his predecessor, is it not appropriate that the First Minister tells us what he will say to Paul Murphy in relation to interference from Westminster over spending decisions that should be taken by the Government of Wales and brought to the Assembly for discussion? An off-hand comment by the Minister for Finance, Local Government and Communities without any condemnation of what was done at Westminster—seemingly on our behalf and without reference to us—is totally unsatisfactory. The First Minister is present; will he take this opportunity to stand up and tell us what he has been saying to Paul Murphy?

The Presiding Officer: No Minister has stood up to reply. In a sense, they have no need to because I have clearly stated the constitutional position according to the Government of Wales Act 1998 and under our Standing Orders. Westminster parliamentarians are perfectly free to make whatever comment they wish in Parliament about the Assembly's work. I would not seek to prevent them. However, it is not for them to make decisions that are ours to make. That is the difference. Westminster may discuss the consequences of devolution but may not make the decisions.

Dafydd Wigley: Further to that point of order, I accept that they have the right to make any comments that they wish, positive

Concerning the specific question, the Minister for Finance, Local Government and Communities said clearly at question time that responsibility for implementing our budgets rests with her and the Assembly. As my former leader, Dafydd Wigley, well knows, Standing Order No. 19 states the Assembly's financial procedures clearly and no decisions on finance can be made through the Assembly without those procedures being followed. The budget of Wales is decided through specific motions in the Assembly.

They probably will be. We need some redress on that in order to protect not only ourselves, but also the understanding of the Welsh public.

The Presiding Officer: Dafydd Wigley has redress; he has members of Plaid Cymru—the Party of Wales in the House of Commons who are able to raise these matters. Redress in relation to anything said in the House of Commons which may be regarded as disorderly or misleading is a matter for the house authorities. I am sure that they will read what we have said in the Assembly this morning.

Peter Law: Further to that point of order, I can understand opposition Members wanting to make political capital out of anything said in another place, but the fact is that we are not responsible for a code of conduct for Members of Parliament. I support and endorse your ruling, Presiding Officer. What is said in another place by Members of Parliament is nothing to do with the National Assembly. [*Interruption.*] It is not. The relevant matters, as the Llywydd said, are Assembly Ministers' decisions that are questioned on the floor of the Assembly. Political nit-picking in the Assembly is not the answer.

The Presiding Officer: This point has been sufficiently rehearsed. Members will know of my great constitutional interest in these matters and that I also have other avenues and platforms by which I may be able to pursue this interesting debate.

At the same time, I announced the setting up in Brussels—to be co-located with the Wales European Centre—of what you could call the Assembly direct office, headed by Des Clifford, which would work side by side with WEC. This took place after months of negotiations between my predecessor and the Welsh Local Government Association.

Fifteen authorities replied, with a clear majority in favour of a review, expressing some concern about value for money, communications and other aspects of service levels. Thirdly, in early March, the Wales European Centre decided to commence a fundamental review of its operations and future, and, later in the month, appointed Sir John Gray—there is no better choice imaginable—to conduct that review.

Fourthly, later in March, the Welsh Local Government Association issued a letter giving 12 months' notice of withdrawal to the Wales European Centre, referring to the need to finalise recommendations later this summer. It also referred to a change of focus in the Wales European Centre's operations and said that it would consider partial or total withdrawal at the end of the day if changes were not made. It also referred to the need to co-operate with Sir John Gray's exercise, which it said would complement the WLGA's consultation. We received a copy of that letter and started to consider the consequences for us. Fifthly, later in March, we received the first intimations from the WDA that all was not well in its relationship with WEC.

I said that a review was taking place—of which you were unaware—and that it would be best to wait for the conclusion of that review before taking a decision. The First Minister: I am sorry, Nick, but this is six of one and half a dozen of the other. There was no-one else there, and I recall the conversation clearly. I am sorry that something has made you change your mind since that conversation.

Tom Middlehurst: Since I have been referred to by more than one Member in the course of this debate, will you assure me that my recollection of our discussions is correct and that they did not include any reference to issuing a notice of withdrawal?

The First Minister: That is correct, Tom. That is also my recollection, and I have never implied otherwise. I am sorry if any Member has understood it to be otherwise. There is some confusion between the meetings with party leaders and the meetings with directors. Tom is a director and not a party leader, and Mike German is a party leader and not a director.

This year, a further £189,000, or £220,000 if you include VAT, will be tied up in WEC membership fees. We were faced with the issue of whether that was the best use of resources, for April 2003 onwards. That is a question for the Assembly: is it better to spend that £220,000 on our office, or is it better spent on continued membership of the Wales European Centre, given the reviews being carried out by WEC and by the WLGA? Is that the right balance?

Secondly, there is the issue of who speaks for Wales. Anyone reading the record of the debate on 29 February 2000, as I have done over the last few days, would see that there was, if you like, a fudging on both counts. We did not see a distinction between the Assembly's direct office, as it then was, and the Wales European Centre; the bodies were to be co-located. That is in contrast to the Scots' arrangements, whereby there is a locked door between the official civil service ambassadorial office and the stakeholder body. We wanted complete fluidity between the two bodies and therefore the distinction was fudged. In light of experience, we do not believe that that was necessarily a good idea, because it has left lack of clarity as to who speaks for Wales in Brussels. That is not a criticism of WEC, nor of the decision on 29 February 2000. However, in light of experience, we believe that there would be greater clarity if we expanded our presence in Europe and made it clear who was speaking for Wales.

I now turn to the amendments. I do not know whether the Welsh Conservatives will welcome it, but we intend to support amendment 7. We will not support the other amendments, but we accept the spirit behind amendment 7 and will support it. The other amendments are either unnecessary or are an attempt to create minor distinctions between the Cabinet, the Assembly Government, the First Minister and the Assembly as a whole. What is clear to us is that this is the best way forward. However, we will be happy to return to Plenary once the negotiations with the WLGA—which are similar to the ones that

If we expand, it may well be that WEC will contract. However, that depends on the will for that existing within the other significant stakeholder body, which is the Welsh Local Government Association. I have told the WLGA that I intend to make it as easy, as cheap, as reasonable and as practicable as possible for it to continue in membership if it so wishes. I cannot determine what it does, but I hope that it will continue its membership. However, that is a matter for the WLGA, not me.

Finally, on quangos, the biggest member in terms of subscription income is not the Assembly or the WLGA; it is the Welsh Development Agency. It is up to it, as it is to Education and Learning Wales, to decide whether or not it continues its membership. The early indications are that quangos are splitting 50:50 on this. We are not putting any pressure whatsoever on quangos, and they will make up their own minds as to whether they want to join us or continue their membership of WEC.

Having listened to the First Minister's incredible speech, it is a pleasure to propose Plaid Cymru's amendments.

As the First Minister has referred to Nick Bourne, Tom Middlehurst, and myself, it is important to put on record what the First Minister said about his meeting with Tom Middlehurst, in order for us to see that he has shifted his position significantly today. In his statement, he said, in answer to Tom Middlehurst:

'Nid wyf yn cytuno na wnaethom drafod penderfyniad ar dynnu allan o Ganolfan Ewropeaidd Cymru'

It is therefore clear that, when he made his statement on WEC, he believed that he had discussed withdrawing from the Wales European Centre with Tom Middlehurst.

At times, the First Minister behaves as if the age of princes has returned to Wales following devolution, and that he is Rhodri the Great, rather than Rhodri Morgan, the First Minister of the National Assembly. Here is a message for the First Minister: we are living in the age of equal citizens in Wales today and political leaders are expected to consult before taking important decisions.

We all know that the Assembly is a hybrid body, halfway between an old-fashioned county council, and a proper parliament. The only way for its Cabinet system to operate is

However, we got a unilateral decision, and he has treated this Assembly with contempt. When the powers vested in the Assembly as a corporate body were delegated to the First Minister, we, as an Assembly, struck a bargain with him: he would form a Government and respect the democratic process, not act like a President with unfettered powers, riding roughshod over everyone and consulting no-one—acting like a tin-pot dictator, as Nick Bourne said.

We know that he spoke to Sir Harry Jones, the Labour leader of the WLGA on 10 April, two days before the decision was announced. That smacks of an old-fashioned Labour stitch-up, and of what went on before devolution, without anyone even knowing about it. It is the sort of grubby deal that has discredited the political process in Wales, and the kind of arrogant approach that is born of the belief that Labour has a divine right to rule Wales. The democratic process has

for the Assembly's responsibilities to be delegated to the First Minister.

Many people saw Rhodri Morgan's appointment to the post of First Minister as an opportunity to have inclusive government in the Assembly, but, my goodness, we have been disappointed. By now, we must acknowledge that the Assembly's coalition Government is even less inclusive than the Government was during Alun Michael's term as First Secretary.

The way in which the First Minister has acted with regard to the Wales European Centre is a perfect example of his dictatorial behaviour. Even worse than that, he does not see anything wrong in that. When we, and everyone else, protest about the lack of consultation, he treats us like children, accusing us of suggesting that he has declared world war three.

This is a simple matter; we have delegated powerful rights to you as First Minister, and we have the right to expect that you consult us when you make such key decisions as that of pulling out of WEC.

Although he has said that Assembly sponsored public bodies can decide for themselves whether they want to remain within WEC, we want an assurance that they will not come under any pressure to follow the Government's line.

I move on to Sir John Gray's review. The First Minister has given us all the excuses he can for announcing the decision in the way that he did. We were told that it was because the WLGA had said that it was leaving in 12 months' time. We were told that the decision had to be made because there is an election in 12 months' time, and that there could be a different Government. There will be a different Government, but all that is tosh, and the First Minister knows it. The reason he has given notice to withdraw from WEC is nothing to do with the election or with the WLGA. It is to undermine Sir John Gray's review, because he knew that Sir John Gray would come up with a solution that he would not like.

In his statement, the First Minister said:

'It is also helpful in this context that Sir John Gray has been asked by WEC to carry out a review.'

Helpful, my foot. Who is the First Minister trying to kid? By announcing his decision to leave WEC six days after the review was announced, he has completely undermined the review. I, and many others who are interested in this matter, have come to the conclusion that the only reason that he did it was to undermine that review. He had made his mind up to leave WEC and the review stood in his way.

Let us be in no doubt about our commitment to strengthening Wales's presence in the European Union and to ensuring that we have

Bring all the parties together, sit them down, and I am sure that we can reach an agreement that will be acceptable to all. Wales needs the strongest possible voice in Brussels and the best voice is a clear and united one.

In a sense, this is the most important debate that we have ever had, because it concerns the credibility of the First Minister. I object to the lies that have been told about my meeting with him and, I suspect, his meeting with Ieuan Wyn Jones. We know of them, as we have the record of his statement. He cannot claim to be credible when he said one thing about his meeting with Tom Middlehurst in his statement and something completely different today. The withdrawal from WEC is a Labour Party stitch-up and he should be deeply ashamed of it. It goes to the heart of his credibility as First Minister. I must say this in favour of Alun Michael: we never had to question his credibility. This instance of lying today is one of the most serious instances that I have ever seen.

The Presiding Officer: Order. Before this goes any further, I draw Members' attention to the Protocol on Conduct in the Chamber, which can be found on the Chamberweb. Section 8 relates to allegations against Members, and it states:

'Personal allegations against Members or other persons will therefore normally be considered offensive, including allegations of uttering falsehoods, allegations of corrupt or unfair or illegal practices and allegations of deliberate misrepresentation. If a Member considers exceptional circumstances exist that could justify a departure from this, the Presiding Officer should be consulted in advance.'

I have had discussions with the leaders of both opposition parties about today's debate. However, it is getting pretty close to the mark and I will have to make a ruling of disorderly language if either of the leaders of the opposition parties continue to allege the uttering of falsehoods by the First Minister. Clearly, there is a dispute about facts relating to meetings. It is appropriate that those disputes should be aired, but they cannot be aired in a disorderly manner.

Nick Bourne: I am grateful for that, Llywydd. However, to restate what the record makes clear, there is an inconsistency between what the First Minister claims he said to Tom Middlehurst when he gave the statement and what he is saying today. That is a fact, as we have just heard.

Today's debate—which the administration tried to deny the Assembly—is essentially about the process rather than the merits or demerits of the Wales European Centre. However, from our amendments, Llywydd, it will be noted that we wish to put on record that WEC has worked loyally in the interests of Wales and the Welsh Assembly Government.

In formally proposing the motion to join the Wales European Centre on 29 February 2000, the First Minister said, and I quote:

'If devolution had existed in 1992 when WEC was formed, I have no doubt that the Assembly would have formed it'.

He went on to say:

'We want to consider this as a value-added exercise, whereby we move in without encouraging other bodies to think that they can drop out as the Assembly will now be funding WEC. It would be a tragedy if they dropped out, as they would not then have the same direct access to the listening post services of WEC that have been built up over the past eight years.'

This view was recently echoed by the Minister for Rural Affairs and Assembly Business, in an article that appeared in his local paper, indicating that there was no discussion with the Welsh Cabinet, the directors of WEC, or its stakeholders. I suspect that the article was written before the Minister was aware of the decision. In it, the Minister for Rural Affairs and Assembly Business recognised the valuable work done by the Wales European Centre, and in talking of the cost, said that it was money well spent.

Nick Bourne: Yr wyf yn ddiolchgar am hynny, Lywydd. The Minister for Rural Affairs and Assembly Business (Carwyn Jones): Under no circumstances have I ever said that there was no discussion in the Cabinet. What I said in that article, which is consistent with amendment 7 to this motion, was that we accept that WEC has done a good job. There is a saying in Welsh: '*Nid da lle gellir gwell*', meaning that there is always room for improvement. That is the situation in which we find ourselves. We must find a way of improving Welsh representation in Brussels. No-one is suggesting that WEC has done a bad job, and simply saying that things cannot be improved upon is a spectacular case of putting one's head in the sand.

Nick Bourne: Perhaps a quote will refresh the Minister's memory, as he seems to have forgotten what he said.

'We also have a large presence in Brussels through the Wales European Centre'—

and this appeared after the First Minister's statement—

'which has been very useful in raising interest in Wales across Europe. Some may say that this all costs money, but the fact is, we need these centres to give Wales publicity and to attract investors in.'

Carwyn Jones rose—

Nick Bourne: I am not giving way again. You have had your opportunity.

That is a direct quote. It seems that the First Minister did not consult with anybody except Sir Harry Jones, the Labour leader of the Welsh Local Government Association, who has disclosed—

The First Minister: I discussed it with you.

Nick Bourne: No, we know that you did not discuss it with me. Just calm down, First Minister.

He disclosed in a letter that he was unaware of the First Minister's intention to pull the

plug on WEC on 10 April—two days before the letter was written. Curiously—or perhaps not—he knew of the decision before the directors of WEC, its staff and Assembly Members.

Perhaps the First Minister was right when he said that the decision to withdraw was not unilateral. It was bilateral; between the Labour First Minister and the Labour head of the WLGA. This bypassing of the Assembly and of proper political process is high-handed, arrogant and deeply damaging to Wales, and that latter point is the most serious in how you have handled this, First Minister.

You rounded on me during your statement, saying that I criticised you for lack of leadership—and so I do. The problem is that you have only two speeds in decision-making—dithering and autocratic. There is nothing in between. The decision to withdraw the National Assembly from the Wales European Centre was not an act of leadership; it was dictatorial and taken without reference to any of the parties or stakeholders that should have been involved in the decision.

I have already made it clear that when the First Minister asked to speak to me about the Government of Wales's representation in Brussels, I said that it was appropriate and vital that it was increased. The First Minister then asked me about the Wales European Centre and its future—not about giving notice. I told him that I believed that it had fulfilled an important role, and that Sir John Gray was conducting an internal review. He told me that he did not know of that review at that stage. I suggested to him that before making any decisions on the future of the Wales European Centre, we should await the outcome of the review. It is on a short timescale, and we know that Sir John intends to report in the third week of May. The wise thing to do, before making any decision about the National Assembly's involvement in the Wales European Centre, would have been to await the outcome of this review. Some men are wise and some are otherwise. The First Minister is clearly in the latter category.

Y peth doeth i'w wneud, cyn gwneud unrhyw benderfyniad am ran y Cynulliad Cenedlaethol yng Nghanolfan Ewropeaidd Cymru, fyddai disgwyl canlyniad yr adolygiad hwn. Mae rhai dynion yn ddoeth ac mae rhai fel arall. Mae'n amlwg bod Prif Weinidog Cymru yn y categori olaf.

Brian Gibbons: Why would an autocratic First Minister bother to have this conversation with you if he was such a tin-pot dictator, as you wish to challenge him?

Nick Bourne: It was not a conversation in which the First Minister sought to ask me about the future of the Wales European Centre in the way that he has suggested. He did not seek my view in relation to the decision that he went on to take. That is the crux of the issue, and I am sorry that you have not realised it.

Irreparable harm has been done to Welsh involvement in Europe. The staff of the Wales European Centre will have been unsettled by what has happened. It would be surprising if they were not making alternative plans for their future. The morale of the centre has understandably been sapped by the unthinking attitude and action of our First Minister. He should be protecting Welsh interests and seeking to enhance our reputation overseas. He has achieved the direct opposite.

This is a characteristic horlicks into which he has got his Welsh Assembly Government—as he calls it—and by extension, the National Assembly. He should withdraw the notice that he served and sit down with the staff and directors of the Wales European Centre, and with Assembly Members, to discuss the best way forward. That would be the wise course of action. Regrettably, there is not the slightest chance of him doing so, as that would involve him admitting that he has committed a serious blunder.

John Griffiths: I welcome the subject of this debate, but not the fact that so far, it seems to have dwelled too much on personalities and different interpretations of meetings. We know of this background, Llywydd, but surely, we all want to move forward, and ensure that the debate focuses on building and improving Wales's presence in Europe.

Rhodri Glyn Thomas a gododd—

John Griffiths: We know that it is far too important to play politics with this issue,

Brian Gibbons: Pam y byddai Prif Weinidog Cymru unbenaethol yn trafferthu cael y sgwrs hon â chi os oedd yn gymaint o unben pot jam, fel yr ydych yn dymuno'i herio?

Nick Bourne: Nid oedd yn sgwrs pryd y ceisiodd Prif Weinidog Cymru fy holi ynghylch dyfodol Canolfan Ewropeaidd Cymru yn y modd yr awgrymodd. Ni cheisiodd fy marn mewn cysylltiad â'r penderfyniad yr aeth ymlaen i'w wneud. Dyna graidd y ddadl, ac mae'n ddrwg gennyl nad ydych wedi sylweddoli hynny.

Gwnaethpwyd niwed anadferadwy i'r rhan sydd gan Gymru yn Ewrop. Bydd staff Canolfan Ewropeaidd Cymru wedi'u hysgwyd gan yr hyn a ddigwyddodd. Byddai'n syndod pe na fyddent yn gwneud cynlluniau eraill ar gyfer eu dyfodol. Mae'n naturiol bod y ganolfan wedi'i digalonni gan ymagwedd a gweithredu difeddwel Prif Weinidog Cymru. Dylai fod yn amddiffyn buddiannau Cymru a cheisio hyrwyddo ein henw da dramor. Fe wnaeth yn union i'r gwrthwyneb.

Mae hyn yn gawl nodwediadol y mae wedi tynnu Llywodraeth Cynulliad Cymru—fel y mae'n ei galw—iddo, a thrwy hynny y Cynulliad Cenedlaethol. Dylai dynnu'n ôl y rhybudd a gyflwynodd ac eistedd gyda staff a chyfarwyddwyr Canolfan Ewropeaidd Cymru, ac Aelodau'r Cynulliad, i drafod y ffordd orau ymlaen. Dyna fyddai'r dull gweithredu doeth. Gwaetha'r modd, nid oes y gobaith lleiaf y bydd yn gwneud hynny, gan y byddai hynny'n golygu cyfaddef iddo wneud camgymeriad dybryd.

John Griffiths: Croesawaf bwnc y ddadl hon, ond nid y ffaith ei bod yn ymddangos ei bod, hyd yn hyn, yn troi o gwmpas personoliaethau a gwahanol ddehongliadau o gyfarfodydd. Gwyddom am y cefndir hwn, Lywydd, ond siawns nad ydym am symud ymlaen, a sicrhau bod y ddadl yn canolbwyntio ar feithrin a gwella presenoldeb Cymru yn Ewrop.

Rhodri Glyn Thomas rose—

John Griffiths: Gwyddom fod y mater hwn yn llawer rhy bwysig i chwarae

Llywydd, and—

Y Llywydd: Trefn. Mae John Griffiths newydd godi ar ei draed, ac mae'n amlwg nad yw am dderbyn ymyriad.

John Griffiths: I will give way when I finish this sentence. We have seen far too many attempts at playing politics with this important issue, and I hope that in the rest of the debate, we concentrate on the real issue.

Rhodri Glyn Thomas: I apologise for getting to my feet just as you started your contribution, but you referred to the interpretation of meetings. I refer you back to the Record of Proceedings for 16 April, when the First Minister said on his meeting with Tom Middlehurst:

‘I do not agree that we did not discuss a decision on pulling out of WEC, but it is a matter of looking at the minutes of that meeting.’

Do you agree that the First Minister should publish those minutes so that we know exactly what he said to Tom Middlehurst in that meeting?

John Griffiths: I am afraid, Rhodri Glyn, that you are doing precisely what I stated should not be done. You are focusing on the wrong aspect of this debate. It is far too important for that; we should be talking about building and strengthening Wales’s presence in Europe.

For example, we know that there are some important issues for Wales in Europe at the moment: structural funds; cohesion; governance; enlargement; the sorts of partnerships that Wales can develop and foster; and the common agricultural policy to name but a few. We should be discussing future arrangements with the other stakeholders, to allow the ASPBs to make their own decisions, and to allow the Presiding Office to take soundings from Assembly Members as to what we could achieve in terms of the Assembly’s representation. That is what the motion seeks to achieve

The Presiding Officer: Order. John Griffiths has only just stood up, and it is clear that he is not taking an intervention.

John Griffiths: Fe ildiaf ar ôl gorffen y frawddeg hon. Gwelsom ormod o lawer o ymdrechion i chwarae gwleidyddiaeth â'r mater pwysig hwn, a gobethiaf y byddwn yn canolbwytio ar y gwir fater dan sylw yn ngweddl y ddadl.

Rhodri Glyn Thomas: Ymddiheuraf am godi ar fy nhraed a chithau newydd ddechrau’ch cyfraniad, ond cyfeiriasoch at ddehongli cyfarfodydd. Fe’ch cyfeiriaf yn ôl at Gofnod y Trafodion am 16 Ebrill, pan ddywedodd Prif Weinidog Cymru am ei gyfarfod â Tom Middlehurst:

‘Nid wyf yn cytuno na wnaethom drafod penderfyniad ar dynnu allan o Ganolfan Ewropeaidd Cymru, ond mater yw hynny o edrych ar gofnodion y cyfarfod hwnnw.’

A ydych yn cytuno y dylai Prif Weinidog Cymru gyhoeddi’r cofnodion hynny fel y byddwn yn gwybod yn union beth a ddywedodd wrth Tom Middlehurst yn y cyfarfod hwnnw?

John Griffiths: Mae arnaf ofn, Rhodri Glyn, eich bod yn gwneud yr union beth y dywedais na ddylid ei wneud. Yr ydych yn canolbwytio ar yr agweddau anghywir ar y ddadl hon. Mae’n llawer rhy bwysig i hynny; dylem fod yn siarad am feithrin a chryfhau presenoldeb Cymru yn Ewrop.

Er enghraifft, gwyddom fod rhai materion sy’n bwysig i Gymru yn Ewrop ar hyn o bryd: y cronfeydd strwythurol; cydlyn; llywodraeth; ehangu; y mathau o bartneriaethau y gall Cymru eu datblygu a’u meithrin; a’r polisi amaethyddol cyffredin, ac enwi dim ond rhai. Dylem fod yn trafod y trefniadau â’r rhanddeiliaid eraill at y dyfodol, fel y gall y cyrff cyhoeddus a noddir gan y Cynulliad wneud eu penderfyniadau eu hunain, ac fel y gall Swyddfa’r Llywydd holi barn Aelodau’r Cynulliad yngylch beth y gallem ei gyflawni yng nghyd-destun cynrychiolaeth y Cynulliad. All these things are constructive and positive; precisely what we should be debating today.

Nick Bourne: I understand John Griffiths's career aspirations, but, how does he think that all these interests have been furthered by serving this 12 months notice, without—even in the First Minister's interpretation of events—consultation with Assembly Members?

John Griffiths: I may be reluctant to take further interventions if they dwell on aspects that I consider unconstructive in terms of the debate that we should be conducting. I do not wish to repeat the history of this issue. I want to be constructive and move forward. That is what we should all be doing.

There is an opportunity to build on, and strengthen, Wales's presence in the European Union, in terms of the Assembly Government, the Assembly as a whole and all the stakeholders that have such a vital interest in building and developing that presence. The people of Wales will want to know that we are concerned with those issues rather than with personalities and different interpretations of meetings—such issues are inevitably seen in the political arena. We must move forward and ensure that the Assembly concentrates on the most important and direct issues, such as developing a greater ambassadorial role for Wales, similar to that of Scotland, within the European Union and in Brussels. We should then concentrate on how the Assembly and stakeholders, such as Welsh local government, the WDA and higher education, can further their ambitions and aims within the European Union. That process will strengthen Wales in Europe. Much has already been achieved through the Assembly Government office in Brussels, through fostering direct access to the machinery of government within Europe and through our presence in Council of Ministers' meetings. We can build on that achievement and take it forward. There are examples of how Wales has benefited from that ability.

Nick Bourne: Yr wyf yn deall dyheadau gyrrfa John Griffiths, ond ym mha fodd, yn ei farn ef, yr hyrwyddwyd yr holl fuddiannau hyn drwy gyflwyno'r rhybudd 12 mis hwn, heb—hyd yn oed yn ôl dehongliad Prif Weinidog Cymru o'r digwyddiadau—ymgynghori ag Aelodau'r Cynulliad?

John Griffiths: Efallai y byddaf yn amharod i dderbyn ymyriadau pellach os ydynt yn ymdroi gydag agweddau yr wyf yn eu hystyried yn anadeiladol o ran y ddadl y dylem fod yn ei chynnal. Ni ddymunaf ailadrodd hanes y mater hwn. Yr wyf am fod yn adeiladol a symud ymlaen. Dyna'r hyn y dylem ei wneud.

Mae cyfle i feithrin a chryfhau presenoldeb Cymru yn yr Undeb Ewropeaidd, o ran Llywodraeth y Cynulliad, y Cynulliad cyfan a'r holl randdeiliaid sydd â buddiant mor hanfodol mewn meithrin a datblygu'r presenoldeb hwnnw. Bydd pobl Cymru am wybod ein bod yn ymwneud â'r materion hynny yn hytrach na phersonoliaethau a gwahanol ddehongliadau o gyfarfodydd—mae materion o'r fath yn sicr o gael eu gweld yn y byd gwleidyddol. Rhaid inni symud ymlaen a sierhau bod y Cynulliad yn canolbwytio ar y materion pwysicaf a mwyaf uniongyrchol, fel datblygu rôl lysgenhadol fwy i Gymru, yn debyg i un yr Alban, o fewn yr Undeb Ewropeaidd ac ym Mrwsel. Dylem ganolbwytio wedyn ar y modd y gall y Cynulliad a'r rhanddeiliaid, fel llywodraeth leol Cymru, y WDA ac addysg uwch, hyrwyddo eu dyheadau a'u nodau o fewn yr Undeb Ewropeaidd. Bydd y broses honno'n cryfhau Cymru yn Ewrop. Cyflawnwyd llawer eisoes drwy swyddfa Llywodraeth y Cynulliad ym Mrwsel, drwy feithrin mynediad uniongyrchol at fecanwaith llywodraeth yn Ewrop a thrwy ein presenoldeb yng nghyfarfodydd Cyngor y Gweinidogion. Gallwn adeiladu ar sail yr hyn a gyflawnwyd a'i hyrwyddo. Mae enghreifftiau o'r modd y cafodd Cymru fudd o'r gallu hwnnw.

I hope—forlornly—that the remainder of the debate focuses on the real issues. We should not be sidetracked into negative matters that do little for Wales and little to build and strengthen Wales's presence within the European Union.

Janet Davies: We have had a good debate—whatever others may think—on the issues that have led to the present situation. I will look at WEC's performance and how it was established. The centre was initially set up by local government and the WDA at a time when central government failed to understand Welsh needs in what was then, and still is, a widening and deepening European Union. A lack of leadership at the Welsh Office and a partial view at local government level led to a structure that was never adequate and is now in need of radical change. The argument about the future of WEC has been mishandled and is unfortunate. If the Assembly agrees to become part of an organisation, it is the Assembly that decides on any changes in that participation and not the Assembly Government.

When WEC was originally set up, it was not given a clear direction. At that time, Wales did not have an Assembly, but it seems that WEC's first loyalty still lies with its founder members: local government and the WDA. We need an office that is given a clear purpose and adequate funding and staffing, which is able to develop a good understanding of how European institutions work, and how we in Wales can contribute effectively and gain the most benefit from them. We have something to give to Europe in the same way that Europe has something to give us. Unfortunately, the official record of much of what happens in the commission is released too late for proactive action to be taken. The only way to find out what is happening is through the notorious practice of networking—doing that successfully requires multilingualists at WEC.

Yr wyf yn hyderu—heb fawr o obaith—bydd gweddill y ddadl yn canolbwytio ar y materion gwirioneddol. Ni ddylem gael ein harwain ar gyfeiliorn i drafod materion negyddol nad ydynt yn gwneud fawr ddim i Gymru a fawr ddim i feithrin a chryfhau presenoldeb Cymru o fewn yr Undeb Ewropeaidd.

Janet Davies: Cawsom ddadl dda—beth bynnag yw barn pobl eraill—ar y materion a arweiniodd at y sefyllfa bresennol. Edrychaf ar berfformiad y ganolfan a sut y'i sefydlwyd. Fe'i sefydlwyd yn gyntaf gan lywodraeth leol a'r WDA ar adeg pan oedd llywodraeth ganolog yn methu â deall anghenion Cymru yn yr hyn a oedd bryd hynny, ac sy'n dal i fod, yn Undeb Ewropeaidd sy'n ehangu ac yn dyfnhau. Yr oedd diffyg arweinyddiaeth yn y Swyddfa Gymreig a golwg unochrog ar lefel llywodraeth leol wedi arwain at strwythur na fu erioed yn ddigonol ac sydd bellach yn gofyn newid sylfaenol. Mae'r ddadl am ddyfodol y ganolfan wedi'i chamdraffod ac mae'n anffodus. Os yw'r Cynulliad yn cytuno i ddod yn rhan o gorff, y Cynulliad a ddylai benderfynu ar unrhyw newidiadau yn y rhan y mae'n ei chymryd ac nid Llywodraeth y Cynulliad.

Pan sefydlwyd y ganolfan yn gyntaf, ni roddwyd cyfeiriad pendant iddi. Bryd hynny, nid oedd Cynulliad gan Gymru, ond mae'n ymddangos bod prif deyrngarwch y ganolfan i'r aelodau sefydlu o hyd: llywodraeth leol a'r WDA. Mae arnom angen swyddfa y rhoddir iddi bwrpas pendant gydag arian a staffio digonol, sy'n gallu meithrin dealltwriaeth dda o ddull gweithredu sefydliadau Ewrop, a sut y gallwn ni yng Nghymru gyfrannu'n effeithiol a chael y budd mwyaf ohonynt. Mae gennym ni rywbeth i'w roi i Ewrop yn yr un modd ag y mae gan Ewrop rywbeth i'w roi i ni. Gwaetha'r modd, mae'r cofnod swyddogol o lawer o'r hyn sy'n digwydd yn y comisiwn yn cael ei ryddhau'n rhy hwyr ar gyfer cymryd camau rhagweithiol. Yr unig fodd i gael gwybod beth sy'n digwydd yw drwy'r arfer anfad o rwydweithio—mae angen rhai amlieithog yng Nghanolfan Ewropeaidd Cymru i wneud hynny.

The centre is reactive rather than proactive. For example, it does not seem to influence the legislative process. It could do this by suggesting amendments to Wales's five Members of the European Parliament on behalf of its membership. There are no signs that it can lobby and influence the EU policy process at the appropriate stage.

There is no doubt that changes are needed. In any new structure it is important that the National Assembly's representation office works closely with other representative bodies from Wales. It is important to create and sustain a single Welsh identity and a single point of contact in Brussels, possibly with separate sub-offices for the National Assembly and an amended WEC in one building. Alternatively, WEC could be divided into sub-sections, such as the WDA, local government, and others, all having sub-representations in the same building. Having a plethora of offices scattered around Brussels would create confusion about who speaks for Wales, and would weaken Welsh identity. It needs a close relationship with UKREP, but should not be dominated by it. It will also be important to have a WEC office in Wales to give information about current issues at the European tier of government. We should consider one office in the north, and whether we could share premises with the commission office in Cardiff.

Given the many problems in South Wales West, we cannot afford anything but the best, whether it is to help the ports of Swansea and Port Talbot, or to help the Valleys, to tackle inner city deprivation, and to improve our environment and economy. WEC started life late, underfunded, understaffed and unclear of purpose. It is time that the Assembly got it together.

Michael German: I will refer to my understanding of the conversations that Ieuan Wyn Jones, Rhodri Morgan and I had, in the context of trying to pull together where this debate is going wrong at the initial stages. If

Mae'n bwysig creu a chynnal un hunaniaeth Gymreig ac un pwyt cyswllt ym Mrwsel, gydag is-swyddfeydd ar wahân o bosibl i'r Cynulliad Cenedlaethol a Chanolfan Ewropeaidd Cymru ddiwygiedig mewn un adeilad. Fel arall, gellid rhannu'r ganolfan yn is-adrannau, fel y WDA, llywodraeth leol, ac eraill, ac is-gynrychiolaethau gan bob un ohonynt yn yr un adeilad. Byddai gormodedd o swyddfeydd ar wasgar drwy Frwsel yn creu dryswech ynghylch pwy sy'n siarad dros Gymru, a byddai'n gwanhau hunaniaeth Cymru. Rhaid iddi fod â pherthynas agos ag UKREP, ond ni ddylai gael ei thra-arglyddiaethu ganddi. Bydd yn bwysig cael swyddfa Canolfan Ewropeaidd Cymru yng Nghymru hefyd, i roi gwybodaeth am y materion cyfredol ar lefel llywodraeth Ewrop. Dylem ystyried cael un swyddfa yn y Gogledd, ac a allem rannu adeilad â swyddfa'r comisiwn yng Nghaerdydd.

O gofio am y nifer fawr o broblemau yng Ngorllewin De Cymru, ni allwn fforddio dim ond y gorau, boed hynny i helpu porthladdoedd Abertawe a Phort Talbot, neu i helpu'r Cymoedd, i fynd i'r afael ag amddifadedd yng nghanol y dinasoedd, ac i wella'n hamgylchedd a'n heonomi. Fe gychwynnodd Canolfan Ewropeaidd Cymru ar ei gwaith yn hwyr, heb ddigon o arian a staff a heb bwrrpas eglur. Mae'n bryd i'r Cynulliad gael trefn arni.

Michael German: Cyfeiriaf at fy nealltwriaeth i o'r sgyrsiau a gafodd Ieuan Wyn Jones, Rhodri Morgan a minnau, o ran ceisio dangos ym mhle y mae'r ddadl hon yn mynd o chwith ar y dechrau. Os yw Ieuan

Ieuan Wyn Jones is honest with the Assembly, he will say that he will recall that, in that meeting, I gave the Welsh Liberal Democrats' position in relation to the reform of our representation in Brussels. I said that there should be a strengthened diplomatic voice, that the balance between WEC and the Assembly should be altered and that there should be a continuing stakeholder involvement through WEC, which should include the private sector.

In that context, I recall—and I have said this to Ieuan in private—that we discussed the process of how the Assembly Government would withdraw from WEC. In that context, therefore, what has happened here this morning has not been in the Assembly's best interests because it has not usefully reflected the parties' views. In his speech this morning, the First Minister expressed the view that I have just expressed, which is the Welsh Liberal Democrats' position. You would expect me to support that position, and I do. That is the position that I put forward in those discussions.

Rhodri Glyn Thomas: I recall the debate on 16 April when we initially discussed the meetings that happened between you, Ieuan Wyn Jones, Nick Bourne and Tom Middlehurst. I recall you sitting behind the First Minister when he made a statement about those meetings. At that time you did not get up to give an explanation of your understanding of those meetings. Why has it taken you a fortnight to recall the meetings and your interpretation of them?

Michael German: There was no debate on a motion; there were points of order, if you recall. It is important that people should always look back at their notes and reflect their notes at meetings. You cannot exaggerate this position. If Ieuan was honest with the Assembly he would know that I referred to that discussion later on virtually the same evening.

Cynog Dafis: Are you suggesting that we are not being honest with the Assembly?

Michael German: No, I am suggesting that if you were being honest with the Assembly,

Rhodri Glyn Thomas: Yr wyf yn cofio'r ddadl gyntaf ar 16 Ebrill ynglŷn â'r cyfarfodydd a fu rhyn goch chi, Ieuan Wyn Jones, Nick Bourne a Tom Middlehurst. Fe'ch cofiaf yn eistedd y tu ôl i Brif Weinidog Cymru pan wnaeth ddatganiad am y cyfarfodydd hynny. Ar yr adeg honno ni wnaethoch godi i egluro'ch dealltwriaeth chi o'r cyfarfodydd hynny. Pam y cymerodd bythefnos ichi gofio'r cyfarfodydd a'ch dehongliad ohonynt?

Michael German: Nid oedd dadl ar gynnig; yr oedd pwyntiau o drefn, os cofiwch. Mae'n bwysig bob amser fod pobl yn edrych ar eu nodiadau blaenorol ac yn adlewyrchu'r hyn sydd yn eu nodiadau mewn cyfarfodydd. Ni chewch chwyddo'r sefyllfa hon. Pe byddai Ieuan yn dweud y gwir wrth y Cynulliad, fe wyddai fy mod wedi cyfeirio at y drafodaeth honno'n ddiweddarach ar yr un noson bron.

discussion around the issue, and we can then perhaps have that debate about recollection. There is every reason to ensure that Wales has the most powerful voice possible in Europe. We are a small nation—less than 1 per cent of the existing European Union population. Further enlargement of the European Union means that we must ensure that we have the best representation possible in Brussels in a changing European Union. It also means that we must be clear about who speaks for Wales and that all opportunities for pushing Welsh interests are developed. We cannot afford to be confused in Europe, and we cannot afford to allow sectoral interests, or even party political interests, to undermine the pursuit of our national interests in the European Union.

I support the action taken by the First Minister for the simple reason that this is in the national interest. A strengthened Government presence will plug a key strategic gap in Wales's representation in the European Union. However, the overall shape of Wales's voice must follow an examination of the tasks. The review period of 12 months, and the Sir John Gray review, to which I have contributed, will allow that to happen. The announcement only deals with one aspect of Wales's voice in Europe—where our Government goes. That is my recollection of the meeting; that was the point that we discussed.

Ieuan Wyn Jones: Let me clarify my position yet again, Mike. You have referred to your recollection. I have no recollection whatsoever of the First Minister indicating that he was about to send a letter to withdraw the National Assembly Government's membership of WEC. That is the position that I recall. Is it not remarkable that when the First Minister initially made his statement, he referred to conversations with four people—Nick Bourne Tom Middlehurst, Michael German and me? Is it not remarkable that when he made his original statement three of the four could remember exactly what was said and were able to respond on that day? Nick Bourne, Tom Middlehurst and I all said that the First Minister did not say that. It has taken you a

We are on the right track to getting the best representation in Brussels that the Assembly and Wales could want.

The reason for having a strong Government voice is that, despite all the Brussels diktat which we hear about from the eurosceptics, the Council of Ministers is the most important European Union institution, and the strongest possible Welsh presence in those circumstances is crucial. If Wales's voice and representation follows the functions that have to be carried out, the Wales European Centre has a future role to play outside Welsh Assembly Government business. That was the position that I put in the discussions to Rhodri, and the position that I understand we are in at the moment. In other words, complementing Welsh Assembly Government business and adding to Wales's capacity to project an image and to pursue legitimate national interests throughout the European Union's institutions. There are many tasks for many bodies and organisations—

The Presiding Officer: Order. You have had eight minutes. I allowed you some time for a long intervention that you accepted. I would be grateful if you would now draw your remarks to a close.

Michael German: In conclusion, we need to support the action taken to date but we must also ensure that we have a managed process. I welcome the First Minister's view and the fact that he will now take into account the views of Assembly sponsored public bodies and of Committees and that those views will

The Presiding Officer: Order. Jonathan Morgan is speaking.

Jonathan Morgan: As a member of the European and External Affairs Committee, I must say that the decision was taken without consultation and regardless of a unanimous vote taken by the Assembly two years ago, regardless of the existence of National Assembly-nominated directors, and regardless of the European and External Affairs Committee. That Committee was not consulted and did not discuss the possible options in relation to WEC. The Assembly has been ignored by its First Minister and that is disgraceful. The people of Wales will see it for what it is.

I was not party to the meetings between the First Minister, Mike German, Nick Bourne, Ieuan Wyn Jones and Tom Middlehurst but it is incredible that the First Minister can adopt one position and three other Members can say something completely different. Members, of course, are bound by a code of conduct and need to be careful about what they say in the Chamber. However, I am sure that many Members in the Chamber will realise what members of the Welsh public will think of the First Minister's performance, about who they trust and which Ministers have credibility—the First Minister certainly does not at present. The public will have listened to the First Minister and to other Members in the Chamber. I think they will believe the comments made by Nick Bourne and Ieuan Wyn Jones, and Tom Middlehurst's previous comments, that the

The leader of the Liberal Democrat group agreed that WEC had done a good job and I remind him of his words, 'I welcome the move to join WEC.' It is not unusual for the Lib Dems to say one thing and then do another. The Lib Dems, as usual, are going belly-up and acting as doormats for the Labour Government, perhaps with the intention of their leader retaining his position in the Cabinet, if he is lucky enough to get it back, as Deputy First Minister.

Michael German: You will recall what I just said to you about what I believe to be my view of what I said in those meetings. I have repeated it this morning: there is a role for a strengthened WEC doing a job that needs to be done in Wales. There is nothing inconsistent in that. You seek to create that view simply because it suits your argument because people's views and distortions of what happened in meetings have distorted this debate.

Jonathan Morgan: First, you will recall that when we initially discussed the withdrawal in recent weeks you refused to speak. You sat on your hands. I suspect that that was at the insistence of the Cabinet. Secondly, you have made your remarks now but I understand that you will probably support the Government today. That completely contradicts the remarks you have just made. Thirdly, it is no wonder that county councillors such as Heather Douglas, who yesterday left the Liberal Democrat group in Cardiff council and joined the Conservative group, are

Jonathan Morgan: As far as I can see, nothing has changed and WEC continues to do a good job. It is capable of reform, and the Assembly should continue to subscribe to it. In addition, as I have said in the Chamber on countless occasions, the Government of Wales should increase its representation in Brussels. We could and should do both. Representation in Brussels should be for the Government as well as for ordinary Assembly Members, who will now be left out of the equation.

In conclusion, my major concern with the decision taken by the First Minister is the willingness of our premier statesman to take a decision without consulting the National Assembly for Wales. He only consulted the Labour leader of the Welsh Local Government Association. That was his course of action. He did not consult anyone here about the appropriateness of the decision, but rather consulted someone who was not an interested party in this respect and who represents a different organisation altogether. As the First Minister was willing to overturn a decision taken by unanimous vote without prior consultation, he sits there today a statesman lacking credibility and integrity.

I deeply regret the fact that we have allowed the important issue of WEC's future to become a political football for party advantage. This debate must surely be about how we ensure that the resource and capacity painstakingly built up during WEC's 10-year existence is harnessed and maintained in whatever follows.

I see a future and a continuing need for the broad-based organisation that WEC has become, to serve the wider needs of Wales in response to the developing European agenda. I seek an assurance that the terms of the motion do not preclude that option, and that there will be a review to address the needs of the National Assembly and the Assembly Government, and to also take account of the services currently provided by WEC. It should be run concurrent with Sir John Gray's review, commissioned by the Wales European Centre. The board acknowledges that WEC cannot stand still and that it will need to shape and refocus its activities to meet the changing and emerging needs of its partners and shareholders. The actions of the Welsh Assembly Government and the board will also run concurrent with the review being undertaken by the Welsh Local Government Association, which is another principal partner. It is worth noting that we should consider the WLGA's position and put it into context. The association has made it clear that the issue of notice of withdrawal is a protective action to allow it to come to its conclusions before the notice expires. It is also an enabling action that may or may not result in the WLGA's withdrawal. All of this work should result in a constructive outcome that will secure the resource currently available in Wales through the Wales European Centre office. Anything less would diminish our presence.

I remain unconvinced of the need to issue a notice of withdrawal. However, when put in the context of the WLGA's actions, perhaps it is more understandable and more consistent with the need to facilitate discussion and for

conclusions to be drawn during the notice period. I remain a committed supporter of the Wales European Centre and the unique broad-based partnership that it supports. I am convinced that the Welsh Assembly Government needs to strengthen its presence and speak for Wales in Brussels. I see no conflict between the enhanced presence of the Welsh Assembly Government in Brussels and its responsibility to pursue the Assembly Government's agenda through Europe's political structures. I accept that the Government must be seen to speak for Wales. However, WEC has a different function and is a different animal. It provides research, intelligence, information and guidance for its sponsoring organisations, which includes the National Assembly for Wales. It serves a wide range of member organisations over which the Assembly either has no responsibility or has delegated its responsibilities.

The announcement two weeks ago raised several concerns. How will the current partnership's needs be met if the actions of the Assembly and others result in undermining the viability of the Wales European Centre? What will be put in its place to serve the interests of the broad-based partnership that currently exists? How will we achieve the economies of scale that the current arrangement provides, with officers in WEC sharing and exchanging expertise in the varied and wider interests of its sponsors?

If the First Minister is giving notice to enable detailed consideration of these issues to take place, the motion is supportable. If the First Minister confirmed that the Assembly sponsored public bodies would be free to make their own decisions, as they were free to make the decision to join in the first place, that would be reassuring. If the First Minister took the opportunity to contribute to Sir John Gray's review, that would be constructive. If the First Minister reassured the WEC board, its partners and, crucially, its staff that his previous announcements would not preclude continuing membership of WEC, all the issues in relation to our collective interests could be addressed within the next few

I welcome the commitment in the motion to report to the National Assembly in Plenary session. I believe that a way can be found to meet the Government's needs in Brussels, to address the continuing needs of the National Assembly and to recognise that the Wales European Centre can continue to provide an important additional dimension to Wales's presence in Europe.

Rhodri Glyn Thomas: Nodwyd dau bwynt pwysig yn y ddadl hon. Yn gyntaf, mae'n bwysig bod gan Lywodraeth Cymru, Cynulliad Cenedlaethol Cymru a Chymru gyfan lais cryf yn Ewrop. Oherwydd hynny, mae'r adolygiad o sut y cynrychiolir Cymru yn Ewrop yn bwysig. Nid oes dadl ynglŷn â hynny. Fodd bynnag, yr ail bwynt pwysig a godwyd yn y ddadl hon yw'r broses a arweiniodd at lythyr y Prif Weinidog. Canolbwytiaf ar y Cofnod yn fy nghyfraniad byr. Mae'n gyfrifoldeb moesol ar bawb i gywiro'r Cofnod os gwnant ddatganiadau camarweiniol yn y Siambwr. Mewn ymateb i Ieuan Wyn Jones ar 16 Ebrill, dywedodd y Prif Weinidog yn glir:

'Ni allaf ddeall sut y gallwch ddweud y gwnaethpwyd hyn heb ymgynghori pan ymgynghorwyd â chi, Mike German, Nick Bourne, Tom Middlehurst ac Awdurdod Datblygu Cymru.'

Mewn ymateb i hynny, dywedodd Ieuan Wyn Jones, Nick Bourne a Tom Middlehurst yn glir bod eu hatgofion hwy o'r cyfarfodydd yn gwbl wahanol i rai'r Prif Weinidog. Ar ddau achlysur, mae'r Prif Weinidog wedi cyfeirio at gofnodion y cyfarfodydd â Ieuan Wyn Jones a Tom Middlehurst. faterion sy'n gysylltiedig â'n cydfuddiannau yn y misoedd nesaf hyn, gan ddileu'r ansicrwydd a sefydlu cyfeiriad pendant.

Rhodri Glyn Thomas: Two important points have been noted in this debate. First, it is important that the Government of Wales, the National Assembly for Wales and Wales as a whole has a strong voice in Europe. As a result, the review of how Wales is represented in Europe is important. There is no argument about that. However, the second important point raised in this debate is the process that led to the First Minister's letter. I will concentrate on the Record in my short contribution. It is everyone's moral responsibility to correct the Record if they make misleading statements in the Chamber. In response to Ieuan Wyn Jones on 16 April, the First Minister stated clearly:

'I cannot understand how you can say that this was done without consultation when you, Mike German, Nick Bourne, Tom Middlehurst and the Welsh Development Agency were consulted.'

In response to that, Ieuan Wyn Jones, Nick Bourne and Tom Middlehurst clearly stated that their recollections of the meetings were entirely different to those of the First Minister. On two occasions, the First Minister has referred to the minutes of the meetings with Ieuan Wyn Jones and with Tom Middlehurst. As there is disagreement on what happened in those meetings, why will the First Minister not publish the minutes of those two meetings so that we can learn exactly what was said? It is his moral responsibility to do so.

The First Minister then mentions the meeting with Tom Middlehurst. He says that he discussed the withdrawal of the Assembly's

Michael German: For the sake of accuracy—because I would like you to be accurate—I said that I had consulted my notes and on that evening, or the next one, I talked to Ieuan Wyn Jones about my recollection. I conveyed both views to him. I have said this morning that my view is the same as the First Minister's. Therefore, I have recollected those facts exactly as I have laid them down for the record for this Assembly.

Rhodri Glyn Thomas: We will look at the Record of Proceedings next week, Mike, because I recall you saying that your recollection was different to the recollections of Ieuan Wyn Jones and the First Minister.

The First Minister also referred to the WDA and said that there had been consultations with it. However, when Janet Ryder asked him a question about this last week, he stated that he did not know whether the chairman or the board of the WDA had been consulted. What consultation did he have with the WDA and why, when Janet Ryder asked him a question, did he say that he had not consulted with the WDA? There have been so many varying statements from the First Minister, so, will he clarify his position? What exactly

presence in WEC. Tom Middlehurst challenged that statement and, two weeks later, the First Minister says that that was not discussed with Tom Middlehurst. Which Record is correct? Is it the Record of the Plenary on 16 April or is it the Record that will be published of today's session? The First Minister must tell us whether his recollection on 16 April of the meeting with Tom Middlehurst was wrong, or whether he has misled us today. It is incredible that Mike German decided not to express a view on 16 April on the meeting that he and Ieuan Wyn Jones had with the First Minister, and yet, a fortnight later he can remember what occurred at that meeting. In response to Ieuan Wyn Jones today, Mike German said that his recollection of the meeting was different to Ieuan Wyn Jones's and Rhodri Morgan's recollections. In other words, his version of that meeting is unique.

The First Minister: I did not want to concentrate on the issues of process and personalities in my response to the debate. However, as Rhodri Glyn Thomas has just issued a direct challenge, before I continue, I will refer to the note that was made by my principle private secretary at the meeting with Mike German and Ieuan Wyn Jones. The relevant sentence reads as follows:

‘Both—Mike German and Ieuan Wyn Jones—therefore agreed that as with the Welsh Local Government Association’s recent move, it was right that the National Assembly for Wales should give formal notice to the Wales European Centre and its staff of its intention to review its present support for the Wales European Centre.’

Nick Bourne also supported this, but I entirely accept that his support was based on information from me and not on the note taken by my principle private secretary.

There has been much ranting and raving this morning and an over-concentration on issues that are not the key ones for the people of Wales. The key issues were raised by John Griffiths, Janet Davies and Tom Middlehurst and have nothing to do with the courtroom atmosphere and barracking that we have witnessed this morning.

Ieuan Wyn Jones: Will you give way?

The First Minister: If I have time, I will give way, but I was challenged by Rhodri Glyn Thomas and that is the end of it. I do not want to concentrate on these issues—*[Interruption.]*

The Presiding Officer: Order. The First Minister is not giving way. Whether or not he gives way is a matter for him.

The First Minister: The key issues are outcomes and process. Mike German

That, in essence, is all that this matter is about, namely whether it should be two thirds to one, and one third to the other, and who should have what share. If we were to expand our presence, would it be right to continue to be members of WEC or should we expand the Assembly's direct government centre and stop subscribing to WEC? That is the key issue for us and we will return to it.

Tom raised many issues. I assure him and the rest of the Assembly that I will come back to Plenary after completing negotiations with WEC through Sir John Gray's review and through the WLGA. The conclusions of those reviews and negotiations will be put to the Assembly for approval in the same way as they were on 29 February 2000.

On the protection of ordinary Members' rights, if we end up with an expanded Welsh Assembly Government office in the same way as the Scottish executive office, what rights will ordinary Members have? When the Ambassador for Austria recently described what an embassy was—although we are not talking about an embassy because we do not have a foreign policy, but Europe is special and our involvement in it is significant—he said that an ambassador's policy was determined by the Foreign Minister and Government of his or her country. He or she represents the country as a whole abroad, and deputations, delegations and opposition members are also given rights, facilities and assistance. I assure the Assembly that if we expand the Welsh Assembly Government's office in Brussels, ordinary Members' rights will be protected. I will negotiate that, in the usual way, through the Presiding Officer to ensure that you are happy with how people going to Brussels in cross-party delegations are protected; they will be given full assistance.

Pan roddodd LlysGennad Awstria ddisgrifiad yn ddiweddar o beth yw llysgenhadaeth—er nad ydym yn sôn am llysgenhadaeth am nad oes gennym bolisi tramor, ond mae Ewrop yn arbennig ac mae ein cysylltiad â hi'n bwysig—dywedodd fod polisi LlysGennad yn cael ei bennu gan Weinidog Tramor a Llywodraeth ei wlad. Mae'n cynrychioli'r wlad gyfan dramor, a rhoddir hawliau, cyfleusterau a chymorth i ddirprwyaethau ac aelodau'r wrthblaid hefyd. Yr wyf yn sicrhau'r Cynulliad, os byddwn yn ehangu swyddfa Llywodraeth Cynulliad Cymru ym Mrwsel, y diogelir hawliau'r Aelodau cyffredin. Byddaf yn negodi hynny, yn y modd arferol, drwy'r Llywydd i sicrhau eich bod yn fodlon ar yr amddiffyniad i rai sy'n mynd i Frwsel mewn dirprwyaethau trawsbleidiol; byddant yn cael pob cymorth.

Ynghylch canlyniad llythyr CLILC, gwnaeth Tom a mi drafod y ffaith ein bod yn dymuno

it to continue as a stakeholder body. We cannot force it to continue as such. Implicit in the WLGA's response is its decision to cease membership. That is the legal meaning, even though it hedges around the issue. It is clear from the WEC articles of association, to which I briefly referred in my response to a question from Ieuan earlier, that once you issue a notice of withdrawal, you will cease to be a member in 12 months' time. Although the WLGA hedges around the issue, it means the same as our letter. We want the WLGA's membership of WEC to continue, but we cannot command that. We want it to be a stakeholder body, but if it pulls out, we must deal with the unfortunate factor of indirectly, or directly, paying for 90 per cent of WEC's costs, and the WLGA then effectively ceases to be a stakeholder. That raises a difficult question for us, which is why I felt that we should issue the notice of withdrawal letter because we are in the same position as the WLGA. We cannot have a position where the WLGA can review its membership, but we are not allowed to do so. We are in the same game now and we can negotiate with it on level terms as we did during those difficult four or five months preceding the decision on 29 February 2000.

Tom asked if I would meet with Sir John Gray. I have already had one meeting with him and we will continue to participate fully in his review, although we were not present when the original decision was made.

Finally, I repeat my assurances to Tom that no pressure has been put on any of the ASPBs, such as the WDA and ELWa, and none will be put on them. The early indications are that they will split 50:50, which gives every indication that some form of stakeholder body can continue. We would welcome that, and the final terms that we have negotiated with the WDA and WEC after the conclusion of Sir John Gray's review will be brought back to the Assembly for its approval.

Ieuan Wyn Jones: Point of order. The First Minister has referred to a note of a meeting,

Gareth Jones: I propose that

the National Assembly for Wales, acting under Standing Order No. 29.2, instructs the Minister for Environment to bring forward draft subordinate legislation to amend the Town and Country Planning (General Development Procedure) Order 1995.

The objective to be achieved is to place a duty on local authorities to consult with health authorities or other appropriate statutory health bodies when they receive planning applications to build schools on contaminated land. (NDM1022)

The motion aims to place a statutory duty on local authorities to consult with health authorities, or other statutory health bodies, when they receive planning applications to build schools on contaminated land. This would be a relatively small change, with limited scope, and would be relatively cheap to implement. However, it would be beneficial and would reinforce and reaffirm the Assembly's commitment to safeguarding the health of children in Wales.

Under the present planning system, it is incredible that local authorities are not required to consult with health authorities, or any kind of health body, at any point in the planning process when considering applications to build schools on polluted land. This motion's only aim is to rectify that deficiency. That deficiency was highlighted mainly as a result of the applications to build schools on contaminated sites in Newport and Conwy. The debate is therefore important, with far-reaching implications, whatever the result. The demand for this change will not disappear.

I will focus my argument on the application to build a new school on this kind of land in Llandudno, in the Conwy local authority area, but much of what I will refer to will be relevant to Newport also. In Conwy, the

The Presiding Officer: Order. This is an important debate under Standing Order No. 29. Gareth Jones must have the opportunity to make his speech. The last debate is over, thank goodness.

As a consequence, the existing school site was available for the expansion of the Asda/Wal-Mart supermarket across the road.

Outline planning permission was given to build the school in January 2000. The applicant was the local authority, through Conwy council's director of finance. Therefore, in this instance, the local authority was the applicant and the final arbiter. Conditions were attached, especially the need to undertake a detailed investigation of the contamination, and to present proposals to remediate the site in line with current best practice. At that time, the reason given for this condition was to prevent pollution of the water environment. No mention was made of the threat to human health and no thought was given to the particular vulnerability of the physically developing child, or young person, who would be exposed to such

school will be built on the site of an old gasworks, a former liquid gas store, a council waste centre and an old landfill site. The public is often asked to place its trust in a system in the hope that that system or organisation will respond positively when concerns are raised. The majority of us tend to conform to the general order of things. However, when people with inquisitive minds challenge the system, it should be possible for them to receive appropriate answers to their concerns. That has not happened in this case. Some members of the public feel that neither their voice nor concerns have been listened to. Essentially, they believe that the system has let them down and they are disillusioned. Why is that, and what went wrong?

Another condition was imposed to ascertain and monitor the presence of landfill gas, in ‘the interest of the safety of the future occupants of the building’. Again, no reference was made to the health of those future occupants. That would seem to confirm that, at that time, health risks were not anticipated to be of major concern.

It is therefore clear that no assessment of the risks posed to human health by this proposed development had been undertaken at that stage. The consultation was incomplete. All these facts are recorded and are not in dispute.

Over the course of the next year, there was growing concern in the community that no assessment of the potential health risks posed by this site had been published, that the contamination of the site was greater than had at first been feared, and that the local authority was not responding to these legitimate concerns.

I received a petition, signed by over 150 parents of primary school children due to attend the new secondary school, requesting that the National Assembly call in the scheme. The same request was made by Conwy Friends of the Earth, a residents’ association, a group of Llandudno town councillors, and a concerned parents’ group. The reply from the Assembly’s Minister for Environment was that as outline planning permission had been granted, the principle of building a school on that site had already been established, and that reserved matters were of no more than local importance, limited to minor issues of design, access and landscaping. That reply ignores the fact that site contamination and remediation proposals were reserved matters in this case.

In simple terms, the decision to build a school was made with no input from paediatric health experts, or anybody with knowledge of the health risks to children arising from contaminated and remediated sites.

In the spring of 2001, concerned about this missing link, I sought advice from the Environment Agency, the Assembly Minister for Environment, the Children's Commissioner for Wales and the local authority. The site contamination investigations had been completed and draft remediation proposals had been prepared, but in May 2001, these reports had still not been published. The local authority's requests for the publication of these documents were denied on the spurious grounds of 'economic confidentiality'. The perception in the community—rightly or wrongly—was that there was something to hide.

Where was I to turn for an independent medical assessment of the potential risks to human health? I sought advice from the Assembly's Chief Medical Officer. I expected an impartial, evaluative assessment of the health risks involved. I was dismayed to receive a reply from a planning officer, reiterating the Government's response to the call-in request outlined a moment ago. I am led to question the value of this expensive post, if an Assembly Member cannot obtain medical advice from the Chief Medical Officer for Wales on a matter as important as children's health.

It was not until September 2001, some 20 months after the original outline planning permission had been granted, that the final contamination and remediation proposals were published. In October 2001, the Children's Commissioner for Wales came to the conclusion that

'this scheme should not proceed in its present form'.

That was based on an objective briefing at the highest level, and his professional responsibility to protect the welfare of children. In response to the major concerns over the contents of those documents, I, along with others, asked the North Wales Health Authority to consider these proposals.

Finally, in November 2001, Dr Richard Roberts, North Wales Health Authority's consultant in public health medicine, made a statement on the site remediation proposals, almost two years after outline planning

permission was first granted—in effect, that was the planning permission. His detailed and worrying response is available for perusal, but I have no time to detail it here.

He listed a long litany of omissions, errors, inconsistencies and limitations to the risk assessment models used by the engineers in producing the remediation proposals. He also questioned, in many instances, the basic assumptions of the engineers. He reiterated his concerns, even after a response from the applicants, and pointed out fundamental flaws in the assumptions for clean-up values for various compounds. Those concerns remain to be addressed. The applicants admit that the process of deriving suitable exposure limits or standards is not an exact science, due to the lack of authoritative sources and that value judgments need to be made at several points in the process.

It seems to me that engineers are making subjective assessments of health risk data that have a huge bearing on the standards of remediation to be applied. Is it not much more logical, in the interests of public protection, for independent, medically qualified professionals in children's health to scrutinise remediation proposals? Must we rely on the subjective assessments of engineers employed by the applicant, developer or landowner? That is the primary reason for this debate. Engineers are not doctors.

Dr Roberts's second submission also reiterated that to alleviate anxiety within the community, the public should have:

'the full facts explained to them in terms they can readily understand, including appropriate public consultation'.

I must conclude that given the depth of concern of the health authority and others—including the Children's Commissioner for Wales—it seems clear that the health authority should have been involved from the outset, when the application first went to the planning authority.

Is that too much to ask?

Earlier this year, the Cabinet sub-committee on children and young people considered a draft report entitled 'Building on Potentially Contaminated Land'. That paper advised that we need to find a robust means of ensuring that health risks and concerns are dealt with appropriately by the planning system.

Jonathan Morgan: Are you telling the National Assembly that, as the Liberal Democrat Assembly Member for North Wales, you refuse to support this motion as tabled by your colleague from north Wales?

Eleanor Burnham: I am saying that I am concerned. I took advice from Conwy County Borough Council councillors—Gareth is one of them—some of whom are parents. I am not a technical or scientific expert, but when I robustly challenged them, I was constantly

Rhodri Glyn Thomas: I was going to share the wisdom of her leader with her.

Eleanor Burnham: Do you mind doing that later, Rhodri?

The Welsh Assembly Government is considering the issue in its entirety. It is working on a comprehensive strategy to ensure that health impact is taken into account in development proposals. The planning system is currently under review, with the document 'Planning: Delivering for Wales' out for consultation. That includes the issue of health risks as a planning consideration.

On a technical note, health authorities are due to be abolished. They do not currently have the capacity to fulfil the obligations of this legislation, if it is passed.

Helen Mary Jones: Today's proposal seeks to amend planning regulations and therefore looks as dry as dust. However, it is about children, their health and their wellbeing. The question is simple—do we believe that schools should be built on land deemed unfit for homes, without a proper assessment of the health risks? It is no more complicated than that. It should not be possible, but there are powerful vested interests and powerful local authorities in Newport and in Conwy, who believe that this is acceptable. Neither authority has taken the proper steps to assess the possible impact of their proposals on

Eleanor Burnham: A wnewch chi hynny'n ddiweddarach, Rhodri?

Mae Llywodraeth Cynulliad Cymru'n ystyried y mater yn ei gyfanwydd. Mae'n gweithio ar strategaeth gynhwysfawr i sicrhau y cymerir yr effaith ar iechyd i ystyriaeth mewn cynigion datblygu. Mae'r system gynllunio'n cael ei hadolygu ar hyn o bryd, ac mae'r ddogfen 'Cynllunio: Cyflawni dros Gymru' wedi'i dosbarthu ar gyfer ymgynghori. Mae honno'n cynnwys pwnc risgiau iechyd fel ystyriaeth cynllunio.

Ar nodyn technegol, mae'r awdurdodau iechyd i gael eu diddymu. Nid yw'r gallu ganddynt ar hyn o bryd i gyflawni rhwymedigaethau'r ddeddfwriaeth hon, os caiff ei phasio.

Helen Mary Jones: Mae'r cynnig heddiw'n ceisio newid y rheoliadau cynllunio ac felly'n ymddangos cyn syched â sglodyn. Fodd bynnag, mae'n ymwneud â phlant, eu hiechyd a'u lles. Mae'r cwestiwn yn syml—a ydym yn credu y dylid codi ysgolion ar dir a ystyrir yn anaddas i dai, heb asesiad priodol o'r risgiau iechyd? Mae cyn symled â hynny. Ni ddylai fod yn bosibl, ond mae buddiannau breintiedig pwerus ac awdurdodau lleol pwerus yng Nghasnewydd ac yng Nghonwy, sy'n credu bod hyn yn dderbyniol. Nid yw'r naill awdurdod na'r llall wedi cymryd y camau priodol i asesu effaith bosibl eu

children's health. It was 20 months after outline planning consent was granted before Conwy involved health officials. Newport commissioned a health impact report, but then set such a low budget that all it got was a soil assessment. That is bad enough, but the Government of Wales has done nothing to challenge it or deal with it. I dispute Eleanor Burnham's assertion that this matter can be left until the end of a planning consultation process, which may take five or six years to complete. I also dispute her assertion that the successor bodies to health authorities could not take on this responsibility as they will take on every other. There is no reason to wait.

The refusal to deal with this matter flies in the face of two of the Assembly's most important agreed priorities—sustainability and children's rights. One key principle of sustainable development is the precautionary principle. It may be accurate to say that we do not know that building schools on contaminated land presents long-term risks to children's health, but neither do we know that it does not do so. The proposed regulation would enshrine an element of that precautionary principle in our planning law—a minor change, as Gareth Jones said. That is reason enough for the Assembly to support it today. This is fundamentally an issue about children's rights and about children growing up today, who will have left school by the time that the consultation process, to which Eleanor Burnham referred, is completed.

We have often mentioned, and endorsed in many ways in the Assembly, the United Nations convention on the rights of the child. Article 24 of that convention sets out the right of the child to attain the highest standard of health. We compel children to attend school; surely they have the right to expect that the schools that we compel them to attend are as safe as they possibly can be? The Government of Wales has already had an opportunity to address this matter in 'Planning Policy Wales'. It did not do so. The Minister has refused to call in these developments and thus recognise them as being of national significance. When faced

with the children's commissioner's view that proposals should not proceed in their current form, the Minister for Health and Social Services wrote to the local authorities concerned to tell them that they did not need to be bound by the commissioner's views. That is astounding. Knowing the Minister's personal opinions, I can only assume that we are dealing with the dead hand of the Welsh Local Government Association and certain key figures in the Labour Party in Wales. We have an opportunity today to lift that dead hand.

Many of us in the Chamber are parents or grandparents. Most of us, I am sure, have children that we love and care for. When casting our votes today, we must consider whether we would wish those loved children to attend a school built on land unfit for homes without a proper assessment of the health risk. That is the only issue that we should consider. If our answer is that we would not wish to put the children we love in that position, then we should support this measure to protect other children in Wales, or we could face a justified accusation of hypocrisy. I commend this measure to the National Assembly.

Brian Gibbons: I represent a constituency with one of the longest histories of industrial development in Wales, so this is a real issue for my constituents. I declare a personal interest because my house is on top of a colliery tip. From my front door, I can see our local village school and from my back door, I see our local health centre. Often, when I am working in my garden, I feel more like an archaeologist than a horticulturist as I dig up horseshoes, bolts and other debris from the old industrial era. I am concerned that Gareth's motion—and Eleanor Burnham referred to this also—is too narrowly focused in terms of the problems that we are trying to solve. There are some contaminated sites in which there would be unambiguous—

David Lloyd: Gareth Jones is asking that health authorities, through their health professionals, be consulted in the planning process. Is that such an extreme request?

David Lloyd: Mae Gareth Jones yn gofyn am ymgynghori â'r awdurdodau iechyd, drwy eu gweithwyr iechyd proffesiynol, yn y broses gynllunio. A yw hynny'n gais mor eithafol â hynny?

Brian Gibbons: No, it is not. I will deal with that point.

There are situations in which the degree of contamination in a particular site will not be disputed and in which it will be as obvious as a pikestaff that a proper assessment needs to undertaken. However, there are other sites, such as the site on which my house and the local school is built—and the site on which Huw Lewis told me the school that he attended was built—which some people would reasonably argue are contaminated. We lack a rigorous definition of what constitutes a contaminated site in the first instance. The evidence linking contamination with adverse health and the evidence base on the health outcomes of contaminated sites is ambiguous. Therefore, a global recommendation such as this motion, which does not define what is a contaminated site and does not specifically address the issue of this wider definition, will cause difficulties.

Some ambiguous evidence regarding landfill sites suggests that they cause health abnormalities, particularly during pregnancy. Even though the evidence is ambiguous, it causes concern. The evidence in relation to landfill sites has only shown significant damage in relation to pregnancy. If health impact assessments will be adopted, they must be conducted on a much wider basis.

David Lloyd: The issue is not ambiguous. We are referring to contaminated sites on which houses will not be built. We need a proper health assessment of sites on which houses will not be built but on which we are willing to build a school, such as the site in Newport.

Brian Gibbons: That is a specific point. I am trying to deal with the general issues that will automatically flow from the motion. If Gareth's motion dealt with one or two specific sites in Wales, what Dai says would be true. However, Plaid Cymru is trying to lay down general principles. We must establish a general principle that will apply across Wales, not just to two sites.

Brian Gibbons: Nac ydyw. Deliaf â'r pwynt hwnnw.

David Melding: Alas, Brian, schools are not often built and are seldom proposed to be built on brownfield sites. Do you agree that local communities have a right to as objective a health assessment as possible? Otherwise, they will be forced to seek other experts. The local council will then rubbish those experts and bring in its own. We need to cut through that problem and seek objective advice. That is why health authorities and, soon, local health boards, exist.

Brian Gibbons: I am coming to that point. As I said, this motion is too narrowly focused.

David Lloyd rose—

Brian Gibbons: Let me finish my point, Dai.

The evidence from Nantygwyddon shows that many assessments tend to cover the minimum needed to meet legal requirements, whereas the correct approach should be to conduct a holistic assessment of the situation within the permitted limits. Gareth's motion would cause people to consider the contaminated site but not the wider impact on health, which needs to be taken into account. As I said, the evidence that we have relates mainly to pregnancy. We must consider a health impact assessment of traffic movement on the area; we must take into account the health impacts of other industrial processes in the area, and we must take into account the physical environment insofar as it will facilitate or hinder physical recreation in schools. If we allow a health impact assessment to be narrowly focused solely on contaminated sites, unidentified and undefined, then we will miss a glorious opportunity to have the wider, holistic health impact assessment that we need.

David Lloyd: You cannot have a meaningful health impact assessment without involving health professionals or health authorities. There is nothing narrow about involving

Brian Gibbons: In conclusion, the new Welsh centre for health will be established as part of the forthcoming restructuring of the health service in Wales. I hope that the centre will be a source for independent advice to communities on all of these issues. That is one of the key reasons for establishing it. However, these assessments must be holistic and take into account the whole situation. If we just focus on the narrow point outlined in the motion we will miss a glorious opportunity.

David Davies: Last year, members of the Environment, Planning and Transport Committee participated in an investigation into the Nantygwyddon landfill site. It concluded that people in that area had been mistreated appallingly and exposed to unnecessary risks due to the poor maintenance of that site. Many lessons should be learned from that. One of the most obvious is that landfill sites are potentially detrimental to the health of those in the immediate vicinity of such sites, or of any contaminated land. Yet, for some reason, this lesson has not been learned by some of those with responsibility for taking planning decisions.

The purpose of today's debate is simple: local authorities should consult with health authorities before building schools on contaminated land. We heard what was happening in Conwy. In Newport, the council is determined to proceed with rebuilding a school in the Glebelands area, despite the fact that that land is contaminated. Helen Mary already pointed out that we have little assessment of the health risks: there was some soil analysis, but that was it. However, even if there had been more analysis, it still would not have gone before the health authority, whose staff are the only ones who can properly assess the health risks.

Rhodri Glyn Thomas: I tried to raise this point during Eleanor Burnham's contribution. However, as soon as she realised that I was going to quote Mike German, she suddenly refused to take the intervention. On the case

David Davies: It tells us that they display the standards we expect—[*Interruption.*]

David Davies: In Conwy, they have taken a different view, but then again, they have a member in the council cabinet there.

Michael German: You will be pleased to note that the health and risk assessment for which I called has taken place. I presume that you have a copy on your desk and that you have read it.

David Davies: It has not gone before the health authority, which is what the motion calls for today. It is a simple change to the planning legislation to insist that, if anyone believes that there is any danger or risk in building a school on contaminated land, the proposal should go before the health authority.

This is her opportunity to show that commitment. All we ask for today is that the reports go before the health authorities so that they can make that

assessment. Let us be fair, they are the real experts on health. We are not experts; the councils are not experts. The health authorities are the experts, so let us give them a chance to assess the health risks properly.

As for the Labour Party, Brian gave us a unique display of verbal acrobatics as he tried to tell us why he will not support this reasonable motion. He said that it was too narrowly focused. That is a nice surprise from the Assembly: we have a motion that is clear and simple. It is for a simple change in planning legislation. We want the health authorities to investigate whether there is any danger in building on contaminated sites. I cannot think of anything simpler than that. Nor can I think of any reason why any reasonable person would want to stop that. If he did want to stop that, or if he did not think that it was wide enough, why did he not amend the motion? He had an opportunity to improve it, so why did he not do so if he thought that it could be improved?

Brian Gibbons: I am waiting to hear the Minister's response to your second point. However, I think that you will agree with me that one of the lessons of Nantygwyddon was that people did what was required of them by the legislation and then sat on their hands, and that was felt to be an inadequate response. The line that you and Gareth are taking replicates that mistake. We need holistic, totally independent assessment, not the narrow definition that is being proposed.

David Davies: We may well need holistic assessments, but today's motion would take us towards that. It may not be the end of the story, but it is a step in the right direction. Let us walk in that direction and take that step.

David Melding: The United Nations convention on the rights of the child—to which the UK is a signatory—establishes one of the main principles of public life: the protection of children. Do you think a situation whereby you cannot build houses on

a contaminated site, but can build a school on it, risks being at odds with that principle?

David Davies: I agree and I call on Members of the Liberal Democrat Party and the Labour Party to start thinking about those children and to start thinking about taking a step in the right direction. Yes, Plaid Cymru proposed this motion; but I am as far from being a member of Plaid Cymru as anyone can get. I am even wearing my Union Jack cufflinks in the Chamber. However, this is a good and perfectly reasonable motion, and politicians should always be prepared to support members of other parties when they propose something sensible.

On another point that Brian Gibbons made, I want to ask—

Dafydd Wigley: On that point, you have put your finger on the nub of this argument. That is, the Government and its lackeys, the Liberal Democrats, will vote against this motion because Plaid Cymru proposed it, as it would if the Conservative Party had proposed it. If it has not proposed the motion itself, the Government votes against it, whatever its merits.

David Davies: It is a sad day for Wales when the Assembly puts politics before people. As somebody who opposed the Assembly, I have always said that, if we can do things better in Wales, we should do that. This is our opportunity, so let us show that the Assembly can work for the people of Wales. There is nothing revolutionary about this motion. We recently had planning guidance that states that anyone proposing to build in a floodplain must consult with the Environment Agency. This motion is based on exactly the same commonsense principles. Let us therefore do something right for Wales today. This is one step in the direction in which you say that you wish to go. This is your opportunity, so support this motion.

John Griffiths: It is time to get back to reality. Dafydd Wigley's suggestion that the Labour group—and I guess this goes for the

John Griffiths: I will give way in a moment. We all understand that this is an emotive issue that arouses strong feeling. I am the Member for Newport East, which contains the Durham Road schools which may be sited on contaminated land, so I am fully aware of that. I respect Gareth's strong feelings.

David Melding: I am surprised that you deny that it is now established policy among the Labour whips to vote down anything proposed by the opposition parties. [Interruption.]

The Liberals say that it is not, but I am talking about the Labour Party. Several Labour backbenchers have remonstrated to me about their concern about this. They have taken those concerns to some Ministers. I have also been told which Cabinet Minister is most irate about the current policy, but I will not embarrass the Minister concerned or the person who provided the information, as it was a private conversation. You only need to look at the votes recorded in the Record of Proceedings to establish that, a few months ago, you started to vote against everything proposed by the opposition parties.

John Griffiths: This has been a sad day for debate. We have answered trivial points when we should have been dealing with serious issues. What you say is absolute nonsense, David, and that is answer enough for you.

David Lloyd: The serious point is about having health impact assessments carried out by health professionals in health authorities. Do you not accept that that should be the case?

John Griffiths: I agree with what my colleague, Brian Gibbons, said earlier about the need to look holistically and more comprehensively at the whole issue. A health assessment was carried out in Newport. I put on record that I believe it would be misguided and incorrect to suggest that Newport County Borough Council, Conwy County Borough Council or the Welsh Assembly Government do not take children's health as seriously as they should. No local councillor in Newport would consider such a matter without the seriousness it demands. People take these matters seriously, and anyone who suggests that that is not so, is doing a disservice to proper debate.

All the safety issues have been taken seriously. We know that there are legitimate concerns, and they have been addressed. I fully accept that we need to go further. That is why I say that there is great strength in what Gareth has said today. However, we need to take a more comprehensive look at all the issues surrounding building on contaminated land, and not just in the case of schools. We could also consider crèches, and other such matters. Given the push to develop brownfield sites, for the understandable reason of protecting greenfield sites, we need to consider all the issues involved, many of which Brian Gibbons mentioned. Let us consider the situation to establish a comprehensive way forward, so that we do not have piecemeal, narrow reform.

William Graham: All Members will know that this matter will not go away. Given increasing pressure from developers, more and more brownfield sites will be offered for development, and may well become school sites. This measure is reasonable. Members will know, from press reports, that the parents of children at this Newport school are concerned. As John Griffiths said, their concerns have been raised, but they have not been satisfied. This measure will go a long way to assuring parents that their children will be able to attend a safe school on a safe site.

The Minister for Environment (Sue Essex): Contamination is a major issue. We need to bring back damaged land into beneficial use, and do so in a way that ensures that the future health and wellbeing of our population is not compromised. I recognise the genuine concerns that Gareth and many people, particularly in the Conwy and Newport area, have about the process of dealing with the planning determination of proposals for two schools. However, it is important that everyone realises that the issue

is much wider than that. It is about how we secure the correct process to determine development proposals where there are environmental or health concerns, and that for a range of developments and of health issues. I am sure that all Members can think of examples of proposals that raise these concerns in their constituencies. We must find a more structured and comprehensive way forward in Wales, one which is much wider in effect and much more fundamental than that proposed in Gareth's motion. That is why I will oppose Gareth's motion and will set out an alternative way forward.

First, on the motion, it is difficult to see how a narrowly drawn, ad hoc statutory consultation requirement for planning applications for schools on contaminated land sites would fit in with a wider, cross-cutting Assembly approach to health impacts in the planning system, which is what Brian alluded to. Why confine the legislation to schools on contaminated sites? Children under five spend more time in their homes than anywhere else. Should we therefore relate this to residential developments also? What about playing fields, playgrounds and allotments? It does not make sense to develop such a limited piece of legislation when we have wider opportunities to get this right. I understand, Gareth, that that stems from your experience, but we have an opportunity for a proper and wider approach.

Secondly, the motion refers to health authorities or other appropriate statutory health bodies. Health authorities will cease to exist in April 2003. Also, health authorities do not always have the expertise and resources to undertake the research necessary to respond to development proposals. Could they respond adequately? We need to take that into consideration.

David Melding rose—

Sue Essex: I only have limited time, David. I want to get through this. Members have had many opportunities to speak this morning.

Pam y dylid cyfyngu'r ddeddfwriaeth i ysgolion ar dir halogedig? Mae plant o dan bump yn treulio mwy o amser yn eu cartrefi nag yn unman arall. Yn ail, mae'r cynnig yn cyfeirio at awdurdodau iechyd neu gyrrff iechyd statudol priodol eraill. Bydd yr awdurdodau iechyd yn peidio â bod yn Ebrill 2003. David Melding a gododd—

Sue Essex: Dim ond ychydig o amser sydd gennyd, David. Yr wyf am orffen hyn. Mae'r Aelodau wedi cael llawer o gyfleoedd i siarad y bore yma.

Thirdly, the definition of a school under section 4 of the Education Act 1995 means that this would not apply to places such as day-care centres or crèches nor to sixth-form pupils not in schools but in further education. They are not covered by the definition.

There is a better way forward, given that this is a key issue for Members. I have consulted Jane Hutt, and this is what we believe is the best way of proceeding. Planning guidance has recently been revised. Guidance is a misnomer; it is much stronger than that. That was issued on 16 April, so it is in operation now. It requires local planning authorities to examine the nature, scale and extent of any contamination that may pose risks to the health of occupants and the wider environment. It also requires them to ensure that new development is not undertaken without an understanding of the risk, including those associated with the previous land use, and to ensure that development does not take place without appropriate remediation. In addition, local planning authorities will need to be aware of the requirements of part 2A, which is part of a regulation applying to contaminated land, to ensure that their policies and decisions are consistent with it.

David Lloyd rose—

Sue Essex: I do not have much time, Dai. It is important that I make this clear, and then Gareth will have time to respond.

Having this legislation in place ensures that the local planning authority assesses whether the ground is fit for its current use. It places a requirement on local planning authorities to assess that the land is no longer a cause of significant risk. As members of the Environment, Planning and Transport Committee will know, we have recently closed the consultation on the Green Paper on planning, which includes relevant issues. Considering the recommendations to the children's policy team, and wider views, three proposals in the Green Paper are relevant.

Sue Essex: Nid oes gennyf lawer o amser, Dai. Mae'n bwysig fy mod yn egluro hyn, ac wedyn bydd gan Gareth amser i ymateb.

Gan fod y ddeddfwriaeth hon ar waith, gellir sicrhau bod yr awdurdod cynllunio lleol yn asesu a yw'r tir yn addas i'w ddiben cyfredol. Mae'n mynnu bod yr awdurdodau cynllunio lleol yn asesu nad yw'r tir bellach yn achosi risg sylweddol. First, on the statutory consultees, for example, the number of these could be revised by consulting those most relevant to an application. Those words are important—most relevant to a particular application—concentrating on those who provide economic, environmental, and health and safety implications of those involved in a parallel consents regime, such as environmental consents. That widens the issue because, in some cases, you may want to pull in people other than the health authority. There must be independent advice on public health risks. The Green Paper recognises that we must ensure that appropriate and adequate independent advice on the public health risks associated with development is available to planning authorities. That covers one of Gareth's main points. That will be particularly important in relation to proposals involving already contaminated or potentially contaminated land. However, that will not only apply to schools, Gareth. It will apply to every type of development. That is important. If we are going to do this properly, it must not be limited to one small but important section. It must be wider. The Green Paper suggests that consideration be given to ways of ensuring that the public health risk associated with developments are examined in the light of appropriate, independent advice, which is the root of many people's worries. This should possibly be provided by amending the list of statutory consultees, and we will be taking that on board.

Local authority applications have not been mentioned this morning, but an underlying concern about that issue was expressed to me. We have referred to it in the Green Paper consultation and acknowledged that there has been public concern, and not only about these two applications. We have put options forward in the Paper. Let us do this in a more structured, thoughtful way, and we will achieve what everyone wants. If we do it your way, it will not place any requirement on the consultee to respond. It will not require the authority to do as suggested by the consultee, which is important. It will not require the authority to take further advice. This motion will not afford any veto to the health authority, nor give any duties or powers to inspect planning approval or to lay down conditions for planning consents. That is important in terms of planning applications. It does not replace the onus on the developer or the education authority who are, in most cases, responsible for ensuring that the land is suitable for the development proposed, because the planning authority does not have a duty of care to landowners. That is disgraceful, given that we are forcing children to attend schools that have been built on contaminated land.

I do not want politics to be part of this debate. I appeal to you as individuals. We have not righted the wrong; it still exists. In years to come, when neither I nor many Members will be here, it is possible that this issue will return to the Assembly. There will be a price to pay unless we get this process right. Forget your politics, colleagues. I am not asking you not to be true to your party. Your party certainly wants to see peace of

Inclusive Government

Phil Williams: A colleague gave me the secret of happiness: strive for something difficult and achieve it in the end. I had a moment of happiness when I was elected to the National Assembly. The service in Llandaf was one of the happiest moments in my life. My abiding memory of that service was the theme of inclusivity. I am convinced that inclusivity is an essential ingredient for the success of the Assembly in its present form.

There are two ways in which this Assembly can achieve the best for Wales. With the same powers as the Scottish Parliament, a well-prepared, single-party Government could confidently pursue a consistent and comprehensive policy. However, with limited and uncertain powers, we must work together with united determination if we want to use the powers that we have to the full. The problems that we face are serious and obvious. At least three parties—and often four—have similar solutions to them. This institution is built for inclusivity in terms of the electoral system that brought me here as a list Member and the role of the Committees in policy making. They are clearly designed for working together.

I made a small contribution to inclusivity. You may remember the original seating plan for the Chamber with Labour Members on one side of the aisle and opposition party Members on the other. I suggested that given the layout of the Chamber, it would be more appropriate for the left-wing party to sit on the left, the centre party to sit in the middle and the right-wing party to sit on the right, like the National Assembly in Paris. The suggestion was accepted and I have had the pleasure and privilege of sitting next to the late Val Feld and now Val Lloyd.

During that first year when Plaid Cymru put forward constructive ideas, they were often accepted and we saw the benefits of inclusive government. Dai Lloyd proposed a medical

Phil Williams: Mae cyd-Aelod wedi rhoi cyfrinach hapusrwydd i mi: cais rywbeth anodd a'i gyflawni yn y diwedd. Cefais eiliad o hapusrwydd pan etholwyd fi i'r Cynulliad Cenedlaethol. Y gwasanaeth yn Llandaf oedd un o eiliadau hapusaf fy mywyd. Yr hyn a gofiaf o'r gwasanaeth hwnnw oedd thema cynwysoldeb. Yr wyf yn argyhoeddedig bod cynwysoldeb yn elfen hollbwysig er llwyddiant y Cynulliad ar ei ffurf bresennol.

Fodd bynnag, gan mai pwerau cyfyngedig ac ansier sydd gennym, rhaid inni weithio gyda'n gilydd yn unfryd ddiwyro os ydym am ddefnyddio'r pwerau sydd gennym yn llawn. Mae'r problemau a wynebwn yn ddifrifol ac yn amlwg. Mae gan o leiaf dair plaid—a phedair yn aml—atebion tebyg iddynt. Sefydliad ar gyfer cynwysoldeb yw hwn o ran y system etholiadol a ddaeth â mi yma'n Aelod rhestr a rôl y Pwyllgorau mewn llunio polisi. Mae'n amlwg eu bod wedi'u cynllunio ar gyfer cydweithio.

Gwneuthum gyfraniad bach i gynwysoldeb. Efallai y cofiwch y cynllun seddau gwreiddiol i'r Siambwr gyda'r Aelodau Llafur ar un ochr i'r eil ac Aelodau'r gwrthbleidau ar y llall. Awgrymais mai mwy priodol, yng ngolwg gweddlyn y Siambwr, fyddai i blaidd yr asgell chwith eistedd ar y chwith, i blaidd y canol eistedd yn y canol ac i blaidd yr asgell dde eistedd ar y dde, fel y Cynulliad Cenedlaethol ym Mharis. Derbyniwyd yr awgrym a chefas y pleser a'r faint o eistedd yn nesaf at y ddiweddar Val Feld ac yn awr Val Lloyd.

Yn ystod y flwyddyn gyntaf honno pan gyflwynodd Plaid Cymru syniadau adeiladol, fe'u derbyniwyd yn aml a gwelsom fanteision llywodraeth gynhwysol. Cynigiodd Dai

campus at Swansea and everyone now agrees that it was a good move. I spoke with Mike German in favour of a development bank, which led, in turn to Finance Wales. Members of all four parties worked together to expose the non-additionality of European funds and victory in the comprehensive spending review led to an extra £135 million in this year's budget. I could add many more examples: the Children's Commissioner for Wales and revised ratings assessment for pump storage stations, which was a pet theme of mine. There are many others. Above all, if a historian were to study 'Betterwales.com' and the Objective 1 single programming document, he or she would pick out whole passages written by Plaid Cymru.

I do not know what the public thought—the media always emphasises conflict—but it is satisfying that albeit through a Labour Government, we could contribute real advances and solutions. I put this on record: Plaid Cymru made it clear that while it reserved the right to amend policies that it thought could be improved, it would not block the budget. There was never a threat to the proper course of executive government.

My memories of that first year may be romantic, but my memories of the subsequent period are of cold reality. Since the formation of a coalition, with a guaranteed majority, the spirit of inclusivity has seriously weakened. For me, the moment of truth was the debate on the implementation of Objective 1. For some time, it had worried me—Phil Williams the academic, not the politician—that the relationship between the local and regional partnerships was not defined and that that was seriously holding up the whole project. I drafted a motion and chose the words carefully: there was no criticism of the Government. I just wanted to discuss a real obstacle to economic progress. I expected amendments or changes to be proposed, but there was no debate. As I started speaking, the Cabinet walked out and only returned to vote against the motion. I make it clear that I was not peeved; my life has been far too happy and fulfilled for me to get upset over a minor piece of theatre, but I did ask myself,

'What am I doing here? What use is it?' Eventually a task and finish group came to exactly the same conclusion, but that was many months later.

I still take great satisfaction in the Economic Development Committee's work. Under the chairmanship of Val Feld and Chris Gwyther we have experienced true inclusivity and rarely do we divide along party lines. We worked hard together on Business Support and came to unanimous and enthusiastic conclusions. Top of the list—number one—was our recommendation for an economic policy board to co-ordinate economic strategy between the Government, the WDA, ELWa, the Welsh Local Government Association, Business Wales and the Wales Trades Union Congress. However, unilaterally and without discussion—we have heard that before today—that was thrown out by the First Minister.

Members of the Economic Development Committee, representing all parties, argued in February 2001 that the draft economic strategy was premature and that more work should be done before it was issued for consultation. Nevertheless, the Government issued it and it was slated and had to be totally rewritten. As a punishment for being right, the Economic Development Committee was no longer involved in any way in developing economic strategy.

Many Members agree that bringing broadband connectivity to all parts of Wales is crucial. I would like to make a contribution to that, but until now no other party has been involved in the technical aspects of information technology. That is not a party political point; it is important that we get it right.

My next point is pertinent and why I did not want to withdraw this short debate, even though I guessed that I would have a small audience. There has been a long, disgraceful sequence, which was only broken, wholly to our surprise, last week, whereby every motion or amendment from Plaid Cymru, however constructive or sensible—and I do

Er hynny, cyhoeddodd y Llywodraeth hi ac fe'i beirniadwyd a bu'n rhaid ei hailsgrifennu'n gyfan gwbl. Fel cosb am fod yn iawn, ni chynhwyswyd y Pwyllgor Datblygu Economaidd wedyn mewn unrhyw fodd wrth ddatblygu strategaeth economaidd.

Mae llawer o'r Aelodau'n cytuno bod dod â chysylltedd band llydan i bob rhan o Gymru'n hollbwysig. Hoffwn wneud cyfraniad i hynny, ond hyd yn hyn ni chynhwyswyd yr un blaid arall yn yr agweddau technegol ar dechnoleg gwybodaeth. Nid yw hynny'n bwynt pleidiol wleidyddol; mae'n bwysig ein bod yn ei gael yn iawn.

not claim that every one is—has been automatically voted down by the coalition. We have witnessed an appalling example of that today in the debate on contaminated land. Just because the idea comes from us—as for regional economic development targets—it must be rejected on principle. We are seeing a regression to the worst form of confrontational politics, where the aim is not to shape the best policies, but to display the exercise of power. I was told by a friend in the Labour Party—you will not guess who that was—that macho elements in the WLGA were unhappy that the Assembly Government was wasting time on partnership and consultation and were demanding firm government. That reflects to me, having grown up in the Rhymney valley, the worst features of the old Labour hegemony in the Valleys.

However, I do not give up hope. I am reassured by those Members in all parties who still believe in genuine inclusivity, and for whom working out the best policy is more important than winning a party advantage. I am delighted by the progress we are making on the energy review.

I have a final point—I have cut out a great deal to save time—but this is important. I know by now that I am more a scientist than a politician, but here is a message for the media: inclusivity is not the delusion of a romantic academic; the confrontational pattern of Westminster is out of line. I lived in Sweden for nearly three years: *et ego in Arcadia, olim*—I myself was in Arcadia once, if I have my Latin right. Inclusivity is the prevailing theme of Sweden. I lived in Kiruna when there was a threat to the mine, and I saw how the Swedes reacted. Whatever the problem, Swedes get together. Everybody discusses the issue, at inordinate length, and works out the best solution. Maybe that is why Sweden is so economically successful and why it had an 81 per cent turnout at its last general election, and maybe there are lessons there for us.

David Melding: I thank Phil Williams for

I add the support of the Welsh Conservative Party to it, because, as a minority party, we suffer from the brutal partisanship that now prevails—and presumably will until the next general election in Wales—whereby all our amendments and motions are voted down. That has the effect of strengthening those within a party group who would like to reply in kind and be equally partisan and obdurate. When I draft amendments and motions, I often think, ‘Let’s contribute, not just highlight the deficiencies as we see them; let’s not return to principles that we hold dear, but which may have been rejected by the Assembly; let’s try to be constructive’. However, it is impossible to do that, and win that argument within your party group if the Government simply votes everything down.

In recent months, the Labour Party and its Liberal allies have turned away from former practice and that has been detrimental to the workings of the Assembly. It goes against the principle and ethos of the Assembly. There was so much to build on, such as the use of proportional representation, which gave my group nine Members instead of one. We have the Labour Government, which had a massive majority in Westminster, to thank for that. However, we are now seeing a reduction in positive developments. Cabinet members have much to answer for in the way that they are directing their ordinary AMs at present.

The Minister for Rural Affairs and Assembly Business (Carwyn Jones): During the Assembly referendum in 1997, and the subsequent elections in 1999, there was much talk of inclusivity and of how this place would become an arena where issues would be debated in non-confrontational manner. I thought at the time that that approach was a little naive. It is right to say that we do not want to see Westminster practices in the Assembly. I smiled wryly at

what David said about brutal partisanship, because I submit that the Conservative Party is not wholly innocent of such partisanship.

There has to be disagreement. When the Assembly was first established, people used to say to me that they felt there was not enough passion or hwyl in the debate, and that people were too eager to be nice to each other. It may be that, by now, debates are on occasion more passionate than some Members would like, but that is the nature of a democratic assembly. We must remember that Plenary sessions are not a true reflection of what happens in the Assembly itself. The Plenary session, with its public face and the need to jockey for position and to put forward a party's point of view, is not necessarily the place for calm reflection. Neither is it necessarily the place where there is cross-party working. Yet we all know that cross-party working takes place in the Assembly. That happens in Committees—in some more than others.

Inevitably, when the coalition was established, a change took place in the way that the Government operated. There was then a majority of Members to support Government proposals. That is the nature of cabinet government, is what we have in the Assembly. I am a great supporter of cabinet government; committee government blurs lines of accountability as far as the public is concerned. For example, had the Agriculture and Rural Development Committee been taking the decisions during the foot and mouth disease crisis last year, it would have had to meet every day. There is no question about that, in terms of issues being appraised. Someone has to carry the can, and that person must be the Minister. The public expects that and wants to know who is in charge. Therefore, in that regard, committees do not, in my view, have a role in terms of making legislation or governing directly. However, they have an important role in forming policy.

During a visit to Northern Ireland last year, I met my colleague, Bríd Rodgers, who is the Social Democratic and Labour Party Minister for Agriculture and Rural Development. She was amazed to hear that I was a member of a Subject Committee and that I appeared before

Dyna natur llywodraeth gabinet, a dyna sydd gennym yn y Cynulliad. Yr wyf yn frwd o blaid llywodraeth gabinet; mae llywodraeth bwylgorau'n pylu llinellau atebolrwydd yng ngolwg y cyhoedd. Er enghraifft, pe buasai'r Pwyllgor Amaethyddiaeth a Datblygu Gwledig yn gwneud y penderfyniadau yn ystod argyfwng clwy'r traed a'r genau y llynedd, buasai'n rhaid iddo gwrdd bob diwrnod. Nid oes dwywaith am hynny, o ran gwerthuso'r materion a oedd yn codi. Rhaid i rywun ddwyn y cyfrifoldeb, a'r Gweinidog yw hwnnw o reidrwydd. Mae'r cyhoedd yn disgwyl hynny ac am wybod pwy sy'n gyfrifol. Felly, yn hynny o beth, nid oes gan bwylgorau'r rôl, yn fy marn i, o ran llunio deddfwriaeth neu lywodraethu'n uniongyrchol. Er hynny, mae iddynt rôl bwysig wrth lunio polisi.

Yn ystod ymweliad â Gogledd Iwerddon y llynedd, cyfarfûm â'm cydweithiwr, Bríd Rodgers, sef Gweinidog y Blaid Ddemocratiaidd Gymdeithasol a Llafur dros Amaethyddiaeth a Datblygu Gwledig. Synnodd o glywed fy mod yn aelod o

it every fortnight. That is unheard of in Northern Ireland. The Northern Ireland Assembly and the committee that she reports to is the place to see real confrontation. She is the Minister and Reverend Ian Paisley is the committee chair. It is a matter of 'them' and 'us'—they are combatants and not inclined to work together in any way. If we consider the Assembly's committee system, we must accept that backbench Assembly Members have a far greater role in terms of influencing policy than they could ever expect to have in Westminster or many democratic chambers in western Europe. Where else, for example, do Ministers take part in Committees and seek to build consensus for policies? Where else are the minutes and papers of Cabinet meetings published as a matter of course? Where else do Committees have an input into the budget process? Rather than simply being told what is happening, Committees are given a distinct role in attempting to influence Government policy. Where else is policy development the first role for Committees? The Agriculture and Rural Development Committee is currently reviewing organic farming. I welcome that, as it informs debate, and the Committee plays a worthwhile role in taking forward such matters.

Bwyllgor Pwnc ac yn dod ger ei fron bob pythefnos. Nid oes sôn am hynny yng Ngogledd Iwerddon. Cynulliad Gogledd Iwerddon a'r pwylgor y mae hi'n adrodd iddo yw'r lle i weld gwir wrthdaro. Hi yw'r Gweinidog a'r Parchedig Ian Paisley yw cadeirydd y pwylgor. Mae'n fater o 'hwy' a 'ni'—ymladdwyr ydynt ac nid ydynt yn dueddol i gydweithio mewn unrhyw fodd. Os ystyriwn system bwylgorau'r Cynulliad, rhaid inni dderbyn bod gan Aelodau mainc gefn y Cynulliad rôl fwy o lawer o ran dylanwadu ar bolisi nag y gallent byth ddisgwyl ei chael yn San Steffan neu lawer o siambrau democraidd eraill yng ngorllewin Ewrop. Ym mhle arall, er enghraifft, y mae Gweinidogion yn cymryd rhan mewn Pwyllgorau ac yn ceisio meithrin consensws ar gyfer polisiau? Ym mhle arall yr arferir cyhoeddi cofnodion a phapurau cyfarfodydd Cabinet? Ym mhle arall y caiff Pwyllgorau fewnbwn i broses y gyllideb? Yn hytrach na dim ond cael gwybod beth sy'n digwydd, rhoddir rôl benodol i'r Pwyllgorau wrth iddynt geisio dylanwadu ar bolisi'r Llywodraeth. Ym mhle arall y mae datblygu polisi'n brif rôl i Bwyllgorau? Mae'r Pwyllgor Amaethyddiaeth a Datblygu Gwledig yn adolygu ffermio organig ar hyn o bryd. Yr wyf yn croesawu hynny, gan ei fod yn goleuo'r drafodaeth, ac mae'r Pwyllgor yn chwarae rôl fuddiol wrth ddatblygu materion o'r fath.

Dafydd Wigley: Do you accept that a Committee can have a mixed role, which can blunt its effectiveness? Holding Ministers to account, particularly on ministerial responsibilities, is a vital role for the Committee. However, in doing that, there will be confrontation, and co-operation is needed to develop policy. That needs to be considered for the future.

Carwyn Jones: Conflict can be inevitable, because the Committee serves a dual role. It reflects the initial legislation that was put before the House of Commons, which was subsequently changed to reflect the cabinet structure that we currently have. There will be occasions when there is confrontation and disagreement; that is inevitable. In my experience, the opportunities for discussion far outweigh the opportunities for disagreement. I know that that is not the case

Dafydd Wigley: A ydych yn derbyn y gall Pwyllgor fod â rôl gymysg, sy'n gallu pylu ei effeithiolrwydd? Mae galw Gweinidogion i gyfrif, yn enwedig ar gyfrifoldebau gweinidogol, yn rôl hollbwysig i'r Pwyllgor. Fodd bynnag, wrth wneud hynny, fe fydd gwrthdaro, ac mae angen cydweithredu i ddatblygu polisi. Mae angen ystyried hynny at y dyfodol.

Carwyn Jones: Fe all gwrthdaro fod yn anorfad, gan fod y Pwyllgor yn cyflawni rôl ddeuol. Mae'nadlewyrchu'r ddeddfwriaeth wreiddiol a roddwyd gerbron Tŷ'r Cyffredin, a newidiwyd wedyn i adlewyrchu'r strwythur cabinet sydd gennym ar hyn o bryd. Bydd adegau pan fydd gwrthdaro ac anghytuno; mae hynny'n anorfad. Yn fy mhrofiad i, mae'r cyfleoedd i drafod yn fwy o lawer na'r cyfleoedd i anghytuno. Gwn nad yw hynny'n wir ym mhob Pwyllgor, ar ôl gweld rhai

in every Committee, having seen some of them in action, but that is my experience.

I do not think that any other administration in western Europe is required to work in partnership more than the National Assembly Government. In terms of openness, accessibility, participation, equality and sustainable development, our record is strong. We have a statutory responsibility for sustainable development and equality of access and opportunity, and that does not exist in many other parts of Europe.

The Government has to govern. It has to be held responsible, and it must present its record to the electors of Wales and ask for their judgment. There has to be an opposition, which must hold the Government to account, and suggest to the electors that the Government has not been performing adequately—or at all—during its term of office. We cannot avoid that. However, as far as the influence of ordinary Members is concerned, in Committees, and outside Plenary sessions—

Phil Williams: Do you accept, Carwyn, that many of the most successful countries in western Europe have never had majority governments, and usually have governments involving a majority of all parties? Some of those that have never had an official opposition have been enormously successful.

Carwyn Jones: The record varies; no one party has a majority in this Chamber, and half of the organised parties here are involved in the Government. In any case, it compares favourably with what happens in many other European countries.

We must accept that there has to be a division between the Government and the Assembly. Most people in the Chamber agree with that, because decisions were often taken in the name of the National Assembly when it had never debated them. One example is planning applications. Constituents used to come to my surgery and say, ‘I have a kitchen extension that is going on appeal to the Assembly’. They believed that that kitchen

Ni chredaf fod yr un weinyddiaeth yng ngorllewin Ewrop y mae gofyn iddi weithio mewn partneriaeth yn fwy na Llywodraeth y Cynulliad Cenedlaethol. O ran gweithredu agored, hygyrchedd, cyfranogiad, cydraddoldeb a datblygu cynaliadwy, mae gennym record ragorol. Mae gennym gyfrifoldeb statudol dros ddatblygu cynaliadwy a chydraddoldeb mynediad a chyfle, ac ni cheir hynny mewn llawer o rannau eraill o Ewrop.

Rhaid i'r Llywodraeth lywodraethu. Rhaid ei dal yn gyfrifol, a rhaid iddi gyflwyno ei record i etholwyr Cymru a gofyn am eu dyfarniad. Rhaid cael gwrbhlaid, sy'n gorfol galw'r Llywodraeth i gyfrif, ac awgrymu i'r etholwyr na fu'r Llywodraeth yn perfformio'n ddigonol—neu'n perfformio o gwbl—yn ystod ei chyfnod mewn grym. Ni allwn osgoi hynny. Fodd bynnag, o ran dylanwad Aelodau Cyffredin, mewn Pwyllgorau, a'r tu allan i'r Cyfarfodydd Llawn—

Phil Williams: A ydych yn derbyn, Carwyn, fod llawer o'r gwledydd mwyaf llwyddiannus yng ngorllewin Ewrop yn rhai na fu erioed lywodraeth fwyafrifol ganddynt, a bod ganddynt lywodraethau fel arfer sy'n cynnwys mwyaf o'r holl bleidiau? Bu rhai na fu erioed wrthblaid swyddogol ganddynt yn hynod o lwyddiannus.

Carwyn Jones: Mae eu hanes yn amrywio; nid oes gan yr un blaif fwyafrif yn y Siambra hon, ac mae hanner y pleidiau trefnedig sydd yma'n cymryd rhan yn y Llywodraeth. Beth bynnag, mae'n cymharu'n ffafriol â'r hyn sy'n digwydd mewn llawer o wledydd eraill yn Ewrop.

Rhaid inni dderbyn bod yn rhaid cael rhaniad rhwng y Llywodraeth a'r Cynulliad. Mae'r rhan fwyaf o bobl yn y Siambra yn cytuno â hynny, oherwydd fe wnaethpwyd penderfyniadau'n aml yn enw'r Cynulliad Cenedlaethol ac yntau heb erioed eu trafod. Un engrafft yw ceisiadau cynllunio. Arferai etholwyr ddod i'm cymhorthfa a dweud, 'mae gennyf estyniad i'r gegin sy'n mynd ar apêl i'r Cynulliad'. Credent y byddai'r

extension would be debated in the Chamber. People need to understand that that does not happen. That was perhaps a fatuous example, but it gives you an idea of people's confusion in that regard.

I believe that, as long as we are sensible, and not misdirected by passion, we can have sensible, passionate and partisan—there is nothing wrong with that—debates in the Chamber. However, I also believe that, within Committees, it is possible for ordinary Members to have an influence, to shape policy development, and to hold Ministers to account to a far greater degree than exists in any other western European democracy. Therefore, Phil, I think that you do yourself a disservice when you say that you feel that you have no influence. I do not believe that people would agree with that. I know that you will be leaving the Assembly next year, and I do not believe that anybody could suggest that you have been quiet, or that you have not in any way attempted to influence the policy of the Government. The Government cannot accept everything that you say—that is the nature of politics—but I do not believe that there is a better example of the exercise of ordinary Members' influence than what happens in the National Assembly.

Y Llywydd: Diolch yn fawr i'r Gweinidog am glo mor feddylgar i sesiwn sydd wedi bod yn angerddol. Daw hynny â chyfarfod heddiw i ben.

Yr wyf yn credu, ar yr amod ein bod yn synhwyrol, ac nid yn cael ein camarwain gan angerdd, y gallwn gael dadleuon synhwyrol, angerddol a phleidiol—nid oes dim o'i le ar hynny—yn y Siambr. Fodd bynnag, yr wyf hefyd yn credu bod modd, o fewn y Pwyllgorau, i Aelodau cyffredin gael dylanwad, i siapio datblygiad polisi, ac i alw Gweinidigion i gyfrif i raddau mwy o lawer nag a wneir mewn unrhyw ddemocratiaeth arall yng ngorllewin Ewrop. Felly, Phil, credaf eich bod yn gwneud cam â chi'ch hun pan ddywedwch eich bod yn teimlo nad oes gennych ddylanwad. Ni chredaf y byddai pobl yn cytuno â hynny. Gwn y byddwch yn gadael y Cynulliad y flwyddyn nesaf, ac ni chredaf y gallai neb awgrymu ichi fod yn ddistaw, neu nad ydych mewn rhyw fodd wedi ceisio dylanwadu ar bolisi'r Llywodraeth. Ni all y Llywodraeth dderbyn popeth a ddywedwch—dyna natur gwleidyddiaeth—ond nid wyf yn credu bod yr un enghraifft well o arfer dylanwad gan Aelodau cyffredin na'r hyn sy'n digwydd yn y Cynulliad Cenedlaethol.
